Projects and Programs

Island County No Shooting Zone Petition Ordinance

The Island County Commissioners are considering an ordinance that would allow neighbors to petition the commissioners for neighborhood no shooting zone[s]. At recent Commission meetings, WWA members provided testimony opposing this ordinance. One of the Commissioners was just replaced, so we are waiting to see if this ordinance moves forward. At this point it is unclear how the Commission or the neighbors would define a "neighborhood." Let the Board of Island County Commissioners know this ordinance is unnecessary as citizens can already petition on anything they want. This is just a way for anti-hunting/anti-shooting politicians to pass their constitutional responsibilities to their anti-hunting/anti-shooting constituents so they can say..."It's what the people wanted".



Thurston County Marine Shoreline No Shooting Zone Ordinance

The incumbent County Commissioners were re-elected.

Willapa National Wildlife Refuge

(Pacific County)

It seems the **Willapa Refuge** will now provide detailed waterfowl count data to the **WDFW**. We were first told it was not available; then that **WDFW** had it; and finally that actually it is in the Refuge files somewhere in hard-copy format, but the Refuge was not going to provide it.

Dikes are scheduled for removal on the next unit this summer.

Willapa Bay Eelgrass

(Pacific County)

WWA is concerned that proposed herbicide spraying of eelgrass on commercial clam beds may have the potential to kill a substantial portion of the Willapa Bay Japanese Eelgrass which is primary forage for widgeon and pintail. WWA provided a critical review of an ecological risk assessment of potential spraying of eelgrass with the herbicide Imazamox. The WA Dept. of Ecology has decided to require the shellfish companies to conduct an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) of the spraying before they permit the herbicide. WWA understands the shellfish growers concerns about Japanese Eelgrass affecting (primarily) their clam beds, and supports targeted spraying of the Japanese Eelgrass, with some monitoring to determine overall impacts. However, WWA is concerned about the possibility of bay-wide spraying of the primary forage for widgeon and pintail as well as potential impacts to native eelgrass, which overlaps with the Japanese Eelgrass, and impacts to other species, including forage fish, that use the eelgrass for cover and/or spawning habitat, and sediment-dwelling invertebrates.

Projects and Programs - Continued

Leque Island Fish Restoration & North Leque Island Wetland Mitigation

(Snohomish County)

The **Ducks Unlimited (DU)** groundwater data collection and modeling report is done. The **Juniper Beach Water System** is having a technical review completed. **WWA** has conducted a preliminary review and their model/report shows that saltwater from **Leque Island** tidal restoration would cross **Davis Slough** and enter the sole source drinking water aquifer. This is contrary to all the "professional" opinions that were provided to **WDFW** stating that **Davis Slough** would be a hydraulic barrier. But then the report somehow concludes that this would not affect drinking water. So, wouldn't this suggest that saltwater from **North Leque Island** is also entering the drinking water aquifer. The saga continues.

Heritage Lands

(Statewide)

What is the Heritage Lands Program?

Farm fields in Stilly valley sold...hunting on this land is unlikely into the future.

WDFW no longer managing its land for waterfowl.

Fish restoration removes dikes on waterfowl management lands.

Snow Goose reserve to be restored for fish habitat.

Want to preserve some farmland for waterfowl and hunting into the future?

Imagine thousands of acres of farmland statewide, all managed for farming and public access, by a hunters' non-profit organization like **WWA**, all paying for itself.

It's called Heritage Lands

"Hunters are litterers" is one of the first things anti-hunters blame us for, along with being drunken slobs who don't care about how or where we hunt or what we shoot (at).

Please pick up your shotshells

Black Cloud Shotshells — From Behind the Gun

In 20 gauge, these shells only come in 4 and 6 shot. They are about 1300 foot per second (fps) compared to some of the other faster 1500 fps shells.

While the slower 4 shot doesn't seem to have the range of the faster 3 shot that I have used previously within 35 yards or so, I have found them to be considerably more lethal. Nearly all of the ducks I hit this year (which weren't many unfortunately) were dead on the water. This was uncommon with the faster 3 shot I used in previous years, where I was frequently shooting ducks on the water after knocking them down. I also noticed more internal bleeding with the Black Cloud shells.

So, seat of the pants, it seems they do indeed have more lethality. I really wish they made them in 20 gauge 3 shot though!

Green and **Lloyd Petersen**, plus a couple of local folks that read about the project in the local paper.

On November 16th & 17th we planted 1,620 shrubs that will provide cover and a food source in the winter. Shrubs included **Douglas Hawthorn**, **Blue Elderberry**, **Mock Orange**, **Bitter Cherry**, **Golden Currant**, **Quaking Aspen**, & **Rugos Rose**. The project on the 16th was done using the **WDFW** shrub planter manned by **Dick Price of WWA** and **Jacob Steele**, **Michael Osborn**, and **John Cotton**, all from **WDFW**.

On Saturday we finished making sure all the shrubs were properly in the ground using the above folks plus **Rich Finger, Eryn Smiley,** and **Dawn Snow.** We were unable to put down the plastic mulch at this time as the ground was too wet and gumbo mud, so we'll complete the project in the Spring when the ground dries out. After the mulch is spread, we will plant the nesting cover grasses.

To date we have put 323 volunteer hours into this project.

Work Party January 17th, 2013

We will meet at a greenhouse located on the corner of **U Rd.** and **Rd.** 6, North of Warden at 10:00 a.m. We're looking at mixing lots of potting soil, perlite, and sphagnum moss, and packing it into small seedling tubes. We are planning to fill between 6,500 to 7,000 tubes — to be split between our effort and **BFI Native Seeds.** They are doing all the watering and maintenance for our help. We will be planting our share in the Spring to help control wind erosion on dikes and around ponds.




box without altering the birds' use of the nest boxes is a



The Dirty Dozen

There are groups that undermine and manipulate systems across America to end hunting, trapping and fishing. These same "less-than-honest" groups also often then exploit wildlife and conservation issues in the name of raising dollars for their devious causes. Here are a dozen organizations that have taken efforts in the past year to prevent you from hunting or trapping:

- **Humane Society of the United States (HSUS):** After losing an effort to have the chairman of California's Game Commission removed because he went <u>legally</u> hunting for mountain lions in another state, **HSUS** then pushed legislation to end the hunting of bears and bobcats with hounds in California. **HSUS** has also threatened to sue to stop wolf hunting in the Western Great Lakes region. Shame on them.
- **Center for Biological Diversity:** This group has repeatedly sued the federal government to end the use of traditional hunting ammunition through attempts to ban lead. This ban would also apply to fishing tackle and would affect all sportsmen and women. The group's information is based on flawed details about lead and bullets. The **CBD** is also working—and suing—to stop Western Great Lakes region wolf hunting seasons.
- **People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA):** This radical animal rights group issued a request for its minions across America to break established hunter harassment laws. **PETA** urged followers to interfere with hunts by protesting, spreading human hair, and other unlawful acts.
- **Defenders of Wildlife:** This group has been working to end wolf management in Wyoming and misguiding the public on the truth about overpopulated Yellowstone wolves. **Defenders of Wildlife** has filed a number of anti-hunting lawsuits and often seeks to recoup its legal costs for the suits from taxpayers.
- **Sierra Club:** This group's board of directors worked for—and implemented—a policy officially opposing all trapping. The **Sierra Club** also tried to end a decades old elk hunt on public land in Wyoming.
- **The Fund for Animals:** They have threatened to sue to halt established Western Great Lakes region wolf hunts after hunters and state game management supporters were successful in removing the long recovered wolves from the **Endangered Species List.** They have also filed a suit that would stop wolf management in Wyoming.
- **Howling for Wolves:** A Minnesota-based group suing to stop wolf hunting in that state. The group claims that the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources didn't properly adopt the hunting season even though it went through the same process as other hunting seasons.
- American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals: Supports laws to prevent keeping dogs in outside kennels (a standard practice across America). They have also filed a legal brief supporting the lawsuit aimed at shutting down wolf hunting with dogs in Wisconsin.
- **Western Environmental Law Center:** A ring leader in a group of eight (8) anti-organizations that want to ban wolverine trapping in Montana until the **U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS)** determines if the wolverine will be placed on the federal threatened and endangered species lists. This is just another "backdoor" ploy to end all trapping.
- In Defense of Animals: This anti-hunting group sued to stop bear hunting in Virginia; has called for a boycott of Alaska over its highly successful and sustainable wolf management program; strongly opposes wolf management in the Northern Rocky Mountains; and is pushing for a federal ban on animal testing for medical research.
- **Friends of Animals:** This Connecticut-based group believes "hunting in all forms is unethical, socially unjustifiable and ecologically disruptive." The group worked against bear hunting in New Jersey; deer hunting in Connecticut; and against many science-based conservation programs. This group claims "hunting is an important cause of many deer/auto collisions... by inciting the deer to be incautious."
- **WildEarth Guardians:** They earn a place on this shame list for working to ban trapping on public land in New Mexico. This group has also sued the federal Wildlife Services department over their wolf management program and has called on Congress to end funding for this important federal wildlife management entity.

Please spread the word on these ANTI groups. Your next hunting, fishing or trapping trip depends on it.

Yes Virginia, Santa has Brought you a 2013 Brant Season in Skagit Co.

OLYMPIA - Brant goose numbers in **Skagit County** are high enough to allow an eight-day hunt later this month, according to the **Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW)**. Brant hunting in **Skagit County is scheduled** Jan. 12, 13, 16, 19, 20, 23, 26, and 27 with a bag limit of two (2) geese per day.

The hunting season was adopted by the **Washington Fish and Wildlife Commission** in August, contingent on a count of at least 6,000 brant in **Skagit County.** A total of 8,960 brant were counted Jan. 2 during an aerial survey of **Fidalgo, Padilla** and **Samish** bays.

"Numbers of brant wintering in Skagit County are up from last year's count of 6,704," said **Don Kraege**, waterfowl section manager for **WDFW**. "The brant season is structured to maintain the limited wintering population of western High Arctic birds (commonly known as gray-bellied brant) wintering in Skagit County."

This year's count in **Skagit County** is similar to the 10-year average, **Kraege** said. He noted that ground surveys conducted last winter indicated good productivity of brant, so this year's increase was not a surprise. About 2,000 brant were counted in **Whatcom County** during this year's aerial survey.

To participate in the **Skagit County** brant season, hunters must:

- 1. Purchase a special migratory bird hunting authorization and a harvest record card available from **WDFW** license dealers.
- 2. After taking a brant, hunters are required to record their harvest information immediately on the card, and report their harvest to **WDFW** by Feb. 15. Hunters are reminded that failure to report by Feb. 15 will result in a \$10 administrative fee added to cost of their 2013 license. Check out the Brant Season in **Pacific County** on the next page.

Hunters who harvest a brant fitted with a metal and/or colored leg band are asked to report the leg band information by calling 1-800-327-BAND or at http://www.pwrc.usgs.gov/bbl/bblretrv/. The leg bands help biologists identify and track the birds.

WWA Board Election Results

The top vote getters were **Dave Farley** of the Seattle Chapter and **Abel Cortina** of the Yakima Valley Chapter, and as such were each re-elected to three year terms.

Timon Gasowski of the Seattle Chapter was reelected and joins **Thor** with a two year term.

Larry Gordon of the Seattle Chapter was re-elected to a one year term, and **Jim Kline** of the Seattle Chapter returns to the board for a one year term.

These six (6) join **Bruce Feagan** of the Moses Lake Chapter in the 2nd of a three year term, and **Howard Hicks** and **Neco Villella**, each in the final year of their two year terms.

Thanks to all who "threw their hat into the ring" and were willing to step up their participation in **WWA**.

Master Hunter Program on Hold

OLYMPIA – With current enrollment nearing 2,000 hunters, the Master Hunter Permit Program administered by the **WDFW** has stopped accepting new applications for membership until further notice.

The enrollment freeze is designed to give the department time to absorb an increase of nearly 30 percent more certified master hunters over the past four (4) years and clearly define the program's role, said **Sgt. Carl Klein**, **WDFW** program manager.

"Since 1992, the program has produced a highly skilled pool of volunteers that assist the department in controlling wildlife damage," **Klein** said. "Now we need to make sure we can utilize the skills of all master hunters."

Klein said **WDFW** often calls on master hunters to participate in hunts designed to remove problem animals that damage property or threaten public safety.

Mike Britton, Chair of WDFW's Master Hunter Advisory Group, said he supports the department's review of the program.

"There is an urgent need for **WDFW** to identify priority volunteer needs and to actively engage master hunters in meaningful work," he said.
