

Projects and Programs

HERITAGE LANDS Farmland & Public Access Preservation

The Washington Waterfowl Association (WWA) has finalized a business plan for private land/public access program called

Heritage Lands.

The program idea came from a multi-stakeholder work group developing mitigation options for the farmland and public access losses resulting from fish restoration projects in the Lower Skagit and Stillaguamish River Deltas.

The goal of the program is for the Washington Waterfowl Association to:

- Purchase & own a limited amount of femiliard in three or four different areas survey the deltas.
- Preserve the farmland in perpetuity through sale of development rights and farming-related easements.
- Lease the land to farmers, supporting and promoting agricultural productivity, infrastructure, and crop rotation.
- Use lease fees to support property management, hunting and other public access, and lease of waterfowl hunting access to other private farmland in the region.
- Promote recreational access and wildlife habitat improvements that do not reduce long-term agricultural productivity.
- Provide research and public education opportunities.


The next hunting season is just around the corner, which means our Chapter business year is coming to an end. We've had a busy year that included such projects as:


We had 24 callers sign up for a total of 51 entries. See tallied results on page 7.

such a hunt. We also may be able to help members get out and chase some snow geese.

Farmed Island

The **Farmed Island** has some crops planted and growing. I have not been over there to check it out, but hear a decent amount of the island should be planted. **Jay Koetje** purchased a barge for **WDFW** out of his own pocket and offered his company's excavating equipment to clean out the ditches, all donated. To date, **WDFW** has not been able to get permits to allow the ditch cleaning.

Also, despite upwards of \$100,000 of donated equipment and services to fix up and maintain the **Farmed Island, Rone** received a call that planning is underway for a new fish restoration project on the island. The concept floated was restoring only half of the island as a compromise. **Rone** replied that the original compromise back in 1999 was half the island for fish and the other half was to be maintained, and taking half of the remaining half of the island is in no way a compromise because hunters and waterfowl do nothing but lose.

It is very important for **WDFW** and other folks to think about this. A private individual has offered in the ballpark of \$100,000 of equipment, time, and supplies to maintain the **Farmed Island** and at the same time **WDFW** is planning to cut the island in half!

Rone will no longer be involved in Farmed Island Restoration Project negotiations. If someone has an interest in following up on this, it would be great if they would and keep us informed.

Leque Island

The groundwater study was approved, so **WDFW** has the green light for restoring a portion or all of **Leque Island. WDFW** has started the process of planning what to do. **Rone** will no longer be involved in this process either, so **WWA** needs a representative to be part of the **Leque Island Restoration Planning Process.**

It is likely at least some of the foot bridges need to be repaired on **Leque** so it would be great if a **WWA** representative could contact the **Skagit HQ** folks, find out if this needs to be worked on, and arrange the work party.

It's frankly amazing what kind of "stuff" members have and want to get Ten percent (10%) of all sales go into the Chapter coffers.



WDFW EASES FIRE RESTRICTIONS ON LANDS EAST OF CASCADES

The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) is easing fire restrictions on all agency-managed lands in eastern Washington, where recent rains have reduced the risk of wildfires. Restrictions on the following activities - enacted August 8 in response to extreme fire danger - are no longer in effect:

- Smoking outside an enclosed vehicle.
- Target shooting outside designated shooting ranges, except on the Wenas Wildlife Area, where a temporary rule prohibits the activity through September 30.
- Use of welding equipment, chainsaws, and other equipment powered by combustion engines. Operating a motor vehicle off developed roads.

Clay Sprague, WDFW Land Manager, said the Department's action is consistent with changes in fire rules approved this week by the **WA Department of Natural Resources,** which provides fire protection for many state wildlife areas.

Sprague emphasized that while some restrictions have been lifted, the ban on campfires remains in effect east of the Cascade Mountains, where hot weather is predicted across the region.

"These changes reflect an easing of fire danger in eastern Washington, but we still urge campers and others heading outdoors to be extremely cautious in any activity that could spark a wildfire," **Sprague** said. **WDFW** eased all fire restrictions on its lands in **Western Washington** on August 15, when wetter, cooler weather reduced fire danger.

Kurt's Snyder's Wader Repair Shop Tips

Like many of you I have been repairing my waders since the beginning of time. There is nothing like a boot full of cold water at 5:00AM in 20 degree weather. These are just a few suggestions that will make your repairs easier and long lasting:

- Store your glue in the freezer between repairs, and don't screw the cap on very tight. I get the use of almost all the glue that way.
- Hodgman glue or Aqua Seal are the glues to use.
- Pinch the rubber part of your wader boots. If you are seeing cracks, then it's time for new waders. You may get a few more uses out of them but that's pushing it.
- If you hunt away from home then invest in a spare wader. You will thank yourself someday if you do.

Colorado State Senate President Ousted in Historic Recall Vote

In a historic recall election Tuesday, voters ousted state Senate President John Morse over his support of tougher gun laws passed earlier this year.

Morse thanked and urged fellow lawmakers to continue fighting Tuesday as results showed he would lose his job.

"It has been an honor to represent the 11th Senate District," said **Morse**, who is the first Colorado lawmaker to be recalled and thrown out of office. "It's been hugely rewarding."

With almost 100 percent of votes counted in the historic recall election of **Morse**, returns show 51 percent have voted "Yes" and 49 percent "No."

Morse called the legislative session where he and Democratic colleagues passed stricter new gun laws a successful one.

"We as the Democratic Party will continue to fight," **Morse** said. He added: "The highest rank in a democracy is citizen, not Senate President, so soon, along with many of you, I will hold that rank, and there's nothing citizens can't accomplish when they put their minds to accomplishing it."

Hugs and tears were plentiful in the ballroom at his election night party Tuesday. Republican **Bernie Herpin**, who won Tuesday night's recall election addressed a crowd of about 75 supporters in a cramped room at the El Paso County GOP Headquarters.

"Thank you to the voters in Senate District 11, thank you for supporting the recall and for giving me a chance to serve you. Thank you for standing up for yourselves and demanding to be heard," **Herpin** said in his victory speech. He added: "This election was about defending the constitution, standing up for our rights and deciding how best to let us decide how to defend ourselves."

The Republican crowd became emotional after hearing **Morse** had conceded, with cheering and wild applause breaking out as soon as the announcement had been made.

Herpin supporter **Calandra Varga** said she had been working all summer getting information to voters about the recall, and fought back tears as she talked about **Herpin** winning the recall.

"I'm more excited **Morse** is out," **Varga** said. "I think we're replacing a very authoritarian style of leadership with someone who is more approachable."

The ouster of **Morse** comes after months of legal spats, millions of dollars in donations and a barrage of intense TV and radio advertisements.

"Since day one, they said it couldn't be done. Tonight, this is a victory for the people of Colorado, and we share this victory with them."

There are currently 69,481 active voters registered in **Morse's** district.

Democrats comprise 34 percent of the district, while unaffiliated voters are the largest group with 38 percent.

"Our turnout is well below what we expected," said **Morse,** while speaking to the press at his election night watch party at a downtown Colorado Springs hotel earlier in the evening. "Certainly low turnout is worse for me than high turnout."

Morse spent much of his time knocking on doors Tuesday and said that despite the low turnout he remained optimistic.

"I think there are an awful lot of Republicans who do think this recall is ridiculous and will vote against it," said **Morse** of a recall election that is a litmus test of sorts in the national debate over gun-control legislation.

Colorado College on Tuesday afternoon shuttled students to-and-from a downtown polling location so that they could cast ballots. A majority of the students were Democrats and voting against the recall.

"I've grown up in the age of Columbine and the Aurora theater shooting, and **John Morse** has stood up to the **NRA,"** said **Sachin Mathur,** a freshman at Colorado College, who is a Democrat from Castle Rock. "He did what was right."

Morse and Democrats passed laws that limit ammunition magazines to 15 rounds and require universal background checks on all gun sales and transfers. **Jay Benson** was among a steady stream of people flowed into the downtown voting center Tuesday.

"It's not just necessarily for the gun votes, although it is important to be able to have as much ammunition in a gun as you want," said **Benson**, a Republican.

Benson cast a vote for **Herpin, Morse's** only opponent on the ballot.

"I'm cautiously optimistic," **Herpin** said earlier Tuesday from the El Paso County GOP headquarters. In a backroom underneath an American flag, 12 volunteers manned the phone banks as other volunteers kept an eye on their computers waiting for updates on turnout numbers.

After calling voters earlier in the afternoon, **Herpin** spent the evening hunkered down in an office away from volunteers.

El Paso County taxpayers are slated to pay about \$190,000 for the recall election, according to the clerk's office...

Waterfowl I.D. isn't just important and ethical - <u>IT'S THE LAW</u>. You won't just get a fine if you shoot 3 Pintails, you will get a criminal citation. You may have to go before a judge to clear your record. Criminal citations can complicate your life immensely, particularly with international travel.

The Grays Harbor WWA Chapter will be hosting a waterfowl identification class, presented by Bill Vogel of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), at our October meeting. Bill previously presented this course at our Youth Waterfowl Workshop and impressed everyone that was there. Mr. Vogel is also a Washington State Hunter Education Instructor and a supporting WWA member.





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
