




The weather in the area is still hot and sunny with a full moon at night so field hunting will probably be pretty slow with the birds feeding early and late in the day.

Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) Work Party

On Saturday September 27th hunter check station volunteer **Dave Lescalleet** and wife **Cindy**, along with the **USFWS Park Ranger Josie Finley** greeted the volunteers for a day of blind cleaning and refurbishing. **Dave** is a retired federal wildlife enforcement officer and donates his time running the hunter check station at **Ridgefield**. With 23 willing workers the group set out to prepare the Refuge for the new hunt season.

We replaced the hunting stools in the new pit blind #12 that we donated last year. The smaller stools will allow more mobility in the blind and should be a better fit for the hunters. The lids on pit blind #5 had rusted out and were replaced with lids fabricated by **Kirk Benson** for his senior high school shop project. We were able to quickly camo the box blinds with Real Grass panels. **Eric Anderson** and other Refuge staff have kept the replacement pumps running during high tide for the last several weeks. They have had to start and shut down the auxiliary pump system at all hours of the day and night. Their work to provide water in spite of the underground power line failure has

ensured plenty of water for opening day. **Bob Taylor** will set out the directional signage for the blinds prior to the opener. Thanks **Bob**!




All proceeds of the event are donated as snacks, trophies, and a catered BBQ lunch are all paid for by **BJ's** family.

I-594 WOULD DO NOTHING TO ADDRESS THE MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS IN AMERICA

Nothing proposed in I-594 does anything to improve America's broken mental health system or strengthen mental health reporting in Washington State. Proponents are making promises to voters that are not present in the initiative's language. I-594 disregards the common threads in recent high-profile gun crimes, where the perpetrator was already under psychiatric care or known to be dangerously unstable, taking psychiatric medications, passed background checks and committed the crimes in a so-called "gun-free zone".



1-594 WOULD NOT STOP CRIMINALS

Criminals will violate I-594 like they break other laws and will continue to acquire firearms where they do now: the black market, straw purchasers, theft and illicit sources such as drug dealers. **You can't change criminal behavior by criminalizing lawful behavior.**



I-594 IS OPPOSED BY RANK AND FILE LAW ENFORCEMENT

The Washington Council of Police and Sheriffs (WACOPS), the Washington State Law Enforcement Firearms Instructors Association (WSLEFIA) and numerous individual Sheriffs oppose I-594. Law enforcement officers see I-594 for what it really is: an unfunded mandate that diverts scarce law enforcement resources away from keeping violent criminals off our streets and simply restricts private firearms ownership without increasing public safety.



I-594 CRIMINALIZES LOANS AND TRANSFERS BETWEEN FAMILY AND FRIENDS

I-594 is 18 pages of costly and confusing regulatory excess. It will specifically regulate ALL "transfers" of firearms, not just sales. The definition of "transfer" is so broad and the exceptions are so narrow that virtually every time the mere possession of a firearm changes hands, even between friends and family members, it is subject to the bureaucracy imposed by I-594, including paperwork, fees, doubled waiting periods, taxes, and government registration in the case of handguns! I-594 makes you a criminal unless you drive to a gun store, get permission and pay a fee to loan or transfer your gun to a family member or friend.



I-594 EXPANDS THE GOVERNMENT DATABASE OF LAW-ABIDING HANDGUN OWNERS

Under I-594, virtually every time the possession of a handgun changes hands, even temporarily, the transfer will become subject to burdensome provisions, including entry into the government registration database of law-abiding handgun owners currently maintained by the Washington State Department of Licensing. I-594 does NOT provide "universal background checks" because criminals will NOT subject themselves to them; rather, I-594 is a universal handgun registration initiative.



I-594 IS CURRENTLY BEING MISREPRESENTED BY ITS PROPONENTS

Talking points and arguments issued by the proponents of I-594 have largely contained misinformation designed to mislead voters. The Washington Alliance for Gun Responsibility (WAGR) talks a lot about how Initiative 594 will keep guns out of the hands of criminals. What they don't report is that Initiative 594 is not aimed at criminals who, by definition, do not obey the law.

I-594 would *not* be an effective crime deterrent and would only impose heavy burdens and legal hurdles for law-abiding citizens who want to exercise their Second Amendment rights.



The reality is that criminals will still acquire firearms where they do now: the black market, straw purchasers, theft and illicit sources such as drug dealers.

Law enforcement resources, however, will be diverted by I-594 to doing background checks on law-abiding, responsible gun owners who simply want to gift, loan, share and borrow firearms.

The "Gifting" Rules Intended to Confuse Voters

WAGR says that if I-594 is enacted, you would still be able to "gift" a firearm to an immediate family member without going through a background check. That is, in fact, one of the few honest claims they make about I-594.



However, what WAGR doesn't tell you is that, in virtually all other cases, you would be committing a gross misdemeanor if you were to simply hand a firearm to an immediate family member or close, personal friend unless you broker the transfer through a dealer, complete the government paperwork, pay the fees, subject the transfer to Washington State Use Tax and, in the case of handguns, have the transferee added to the state registration database of law-abiding handgun owners.

The Bureaucracy Burdens

WAGR is NOT honest about the extent to which law-abiding citizens will be impacted by their proposed 18-page monstrosity of bureaucracy, regulation taxation and state recordkeeping. They claim that I-594 regulates private firearm "sales" and contains "reasonable" exemptions.



In reality, I-594 regulates all firearm "transfers" and the exemptions are so narrow and limited that, in most cases, they will not apply.

Let's take a look at their proposed language: Again, I-594 regulates private firearm transfers and defines "transfer" as "the intended delivery of a firearm to another person without consideration of payment or promise of payment including, but not limited to, gifts and loans." A few minutes spent with Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary will clarify that "intended" means "intentional," and "deliver" means "to hand over."



So, if you intentionally hand over a firearm to another person, you have just committed a gross misdemeanor under the provisions of I-594 (or a felony for a second occasion).

What might constitute an "unintentional" transfer? Well, someone stealing your firearm would certainly be a transfer you did not intend. But that would not be covered by I-594 (see paragraph 1 above).

A Lesson in Hunting Under Initiative 594

So, yes, as WAGR boasts about their exemptions, a father could "gift" a shotgun to his son. But if Dad wanted to borrow the shotgun back from his son to use for a weekend hunting trip, that transfer would be subject to the I-594 bureaucracy. And, for Dad to return the shotgun to his son, it is back to the dealer to go through the whole process again!



While WAGR claims there is an exemption for hunting, it is unworkably narrow.

If you are out hunting with your Dad or lifelong friend and his firearm malfunctions, you could loan them a spare as long as they only possess it where hunting is legal. But, as described before, you could not loan them a firearm to take on a trip without you.

Further, under the "while hunting" exemption, what happens when they cross a road from which hunting is illegal. They either have you carry the firearm across the road for them or you have just committed a gross misdemeanor.

The Wide-Ranging Criminalization of Firearm Transfers

There is an exemption for the temporary transfer of a firearm "at an established shooting range authorized by the governing body of the jurisdiction in which such range is located."



While this exemption allows you to loan your firearm to a family member or friend to shoot at an authorized range, you would become a criminal if you make the same loan while target shooting on public land.

When this was pointed out to WAGR Spokesperson Cheryl Stumbo during debate, her response was that you shouldn't be shooting on public land anyway because it is not safe and that, family shooting trips on public land are "one in a million...extreme hypothetical examples. If you want to go on public land to shoot guns, go hunting." (Click Here to Watch the Full Debate) That should give you an idea where the proponents of I-594 are headed!

Age is Everything

One final example of the deeply flawed provisions of Initiative 594: There is another exemption for the temporary transfer of a firearm to a person who is under 18 years of age while under the direct supervision of a responsible adult. So, if you are out shooting on public land with your 17-year old daughter, you can hand over your firearm for her to shoot.



But next week in the same location, after celebrating her 18th birthday, you can no longer allow her to handle your firearm without brokering the transfer through a licensed firearms dealer.

But WAGR is apparently okay with that because they believe you shouldn't be shooting on public land anyway.

Federal Mandates Undermine State Wildlife Mgmt. (From **Biggameforever.org**)

There is a new threat that puts previous efforts to shame. A petition is before the Obama administration that will restrict access on 165M acres of prime deer and upland bird hunting areas in the Western United States by listing the Greater Sage-Grouse on the Endangered Species List. In A Nutshell.... (Compiled from multiple news sources)

Initiative 594 would extend criminal background checks to all gun sales or transfers. Background checks would not be required for gifts between <u>immediate family</u> members or for antiques.

Initiative 591, the opposite of I-594, would forbid the government from requiring background checks <u>unless a uniform national standard is required</u>. It would also make it unlawful for any government agency to confiscate guns or other firearms from citizens without due process.

Think about it. If as proponents of I-594 argue, it is only a "universal background check" measure, then why does it take 18 pages to describe the Initiative?

Those opposed to I-594 argue that it is really a <u>universal handgun registration</u> scheme being pushed by a very wealthy group of anti-gun elitists.

<u>The reason</u>: Buried in the 18 pages, under I-594 every time a handgun is transferred, the person receiving the handgun will have their name added to a database being maintained by the **WA State Department of Licensing**. 




