Habitat, Hunting, Legislation, Legal

These four topics can be used to put into action, the mission of the Washington Waterfowl Association (WWA) and support the Heritage of waterfowling. They also can be used to create action plans for WWA **Chapters.** In order of priority, I suggest folks start with habitat and hunting.

I particularly try to wrap up "History" in the hunting topic so we don't forget that over 100 years ago it was hunters who stopped the commercial harvest of waterfowl so that the birds could survive. Today we base hunter harvest on the biology of the birds. A simple and yet so effective concept.

Acting upon aspects of each of these four (4) large topics leads us to the *Hunting Heritage* much more effectively than focusing on just one. Each of the Chapters are working on these themes in their own way. Each differently, each definitely with their own fingerprint. That is the purposeful design of WWA... it is why we developed autonomous Chapters, because the types of hunting and relationships with land managers and private landowners are different across our state.

This diversity is what makes us effective, but also what makes things more difficult, particularly when it comes to the "Legislation" and "Legal" topics, because we all have differing opinions, particularly in regard to laws and rules. But from my perspective as President, I see and hear of each Chapter doing different parts of the *Heritage*, but all within the topics of Habitat, Hunting, Legislation, and Legal.

Whether you realize it or not, the effect of each Chapter completing different projects and actions, all comes together at the State level. My goal is (Continued on Page 2)



Moses Lake Chapter News

With the help of Bill & Rosann Green, Bruce Feagan, Jeff Waltz, Ken Shields, Marv Leyda, Col. Tom O'Dell, Robin Hickok, John Arrabito, Dick Price, and WDFW Asst. District Wildlife Biologist, Orrin Duvuvuei over two (2) full days, we were able to complete the two (2) ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) capable hunting blinds on 4x4 skids and get them painted.

The blinds are $6.5' \times 12'$ and there are two (2) benches for each blind, plus room for a wheelchair to swivel a full 360 degrees. **Col. O'Dell** is going to follow up with building dog kennels — one of which will go in front of each blind — when we get the blinds set in place.

This project is being done through an **Aquatic Lands Enhancement Account (ALEA)** grant that we secured to (1) build and install the pair of **ADA** capable blinds and (2) create an access road into them. The next step in the process is for WDFW to fix the culvert on the road into the **Frenchman Registered Access Area, (RAA) (f/k/a Quality Hunt Area)** so it can be graveled and the blind positions determined. Hopefully that can happen before the end of April and then the blinds will be hauled out and put in place probably in September in time for the Youth hunt.

If you know a disabled youth hunter you might want to advise them to watch the **WDFW** web site to sign up to use the blinds for the Youth Hunt. The entry ultimately will have a padlock, and the key will be available to handicapped hunters through the reservation system.

Most of the ducks have flown north now leaving the resident birds behind. The local waterfowl are all showing their mating colors, and the nesting fights are in progress! We have spotted a nesting pair of widgeon in a wooded water hole near the **Chehalis River.** I didn't think that widgeon nested here.

There are still many geese here but I think they are just staging for the northern flights. They too will soon be leaving their resident brethren behind. It's a neat time of the year for the waterfowl, and the humans that like to watch them. I suggest that all waterfowlers take some time to check them out. If you go, take along a good camera and some binoculars. You'll be glad you did.

Artificial Nesting Structures

Our Chapter has recently install four (4) cedar goose nesting platforms on **Cedarville Farms** property. I'm very glad to report that there has been some geese fighting for one of them! We also installed two (2) cedar hen houses, but I don't know as of yet if they have been occupied.

We have added four (4) new Wood Duck nest boxes on a private property along McAllister Creek and six (6) new boxes at the **Cedarville** properties. Four (4) were replacements and two (2) were new installs. Our nest boxes at **Scatter Creek** have not been doing well except for the mergansers, squirrels and bees with only one being used by the Woodies. This may be a good thing though as the Wood ducks just may have their own natural nests there.

Shooting Opportunity

Our first Chapter Turkey shoot is scheduled for the 27th of June at the **Evergreen Sportsmen's Club** near **Littlerock.** I am late making up the flyer, but I promise to send it out as soon as I do.





- North Mantrap Lake will have more wetlands opened up around blind #6.
- South Big Lake will have a dike added to assist manipulation for water levels and possible a new blind in the future.

Increase the wetland area around blind #4 and move it

closer to the dike with directional shooting towards the west and away from development across **Lake River.** This would be an opportunity to replace the blind with one similar to blind #12, donated by **WWA-LC** in 2012.

 We discussed improvements for blind access and adding blinds providing they don't decrease the quality of the hunt experience.

We are in the process of putting together a work list to map out future projects and time lines for completing them. The committee will meet regularly throughout the year to revise and update the maintenance and improvements in the hunt area.

We have learned from experience that this sometimes boring and tedious administrative and indoor meeting[s] work is just as —
