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

Quincy Wildlife Management Area (WMA)

For those of you that hunt this area and in particular **Flat Lake** I have some good news!

Flat Lake is a seep lake that fills when they turn the irrigation water into the main canal adjacent to the lake. It fills and becomes a very popular nesting and brood rearing lake for Waterfowl.

In 2019 I was contacted by the person that owned two (2) parcels of private land/water around and into **Flat Lake.** Like me he was getting on in years and had always left his properties open for public hunting and was interested in making sure they stayed that way when he passed.

I did some investigation and made a proposal to the WDFW Region 2 folks that they should try and purchase the two (2) parcels. They put together a proposal to purchase the parcels using Migratory Bird Stamp & Print funds in the 2022-2023 budget. The proposal ended up being the No. 1 Capital Project for Stamp & Print funds.

I got a call last week from the owner thanking me for my efforts, and informing me the **WDFW** properties people had been to the site and were authorizing the purchase to go forward. He said they expect the purchase to be complete by the end of August.

This shows what can happen if we work together with a willing landowner — that only wanted a <u>fair price</u> to keep an area open for public hunting — and we work with the right **WDFW** employees to help do the research to make it happen.

Installation of ADA Blind at Drumheller Access

On Friday, April 8th, WWA-ML Chapter members Bruce Feagan, Marvin Leyda, Tom O'Dell, Ken Shields and Todd Teeters along with NW Chapter member, Paul McGovern, joined WDFW staff Chatten McPherson and Ryan Walker to assemble an ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) blind at the Drumheller Access of Rocky Ford Creek at the north end of Moses Lake. Samish Unit Clean Up — Saturday, April 30th

Member **Bob Taylor** helped out and had already refurbished a good number boxes in **South Shillapoo** earlier in the week. Thanks to **Bob, Bill Dose, Michael Andreotti, Jack Whitney** and **Doug Hargin** for their help.

Waterfowling Down Mexico Way... By John Otto

Three (3) days of waterfowling in Mexico with the fine writing of John is presented for your enjoyment. Day #1 was published in the March 2022 Newsletter linked here. Day 2

After a successful first day, **Dave Drewry** and I now took what we learned and could expect into day two. Once again we met in the lobby of the resort at 5:30 am, only this time we were only going an hour away in a totally different area. Excited, we were off!


Arrived in full daylight and parked at the end of a grove of trees with a little trail... got ready... and headed off into the bush. Eighty (80) yards in and the trail opened into

a meadow with a huge pond on the left, and through the thin trees a massive salt water bay to the right.

We were instructed to shoot over the pond, and not back on the bay as that is a refuge. The bay was expansive and beautiful with only glimpses visible as we were in a bowl of cover. Of course we kicked 1,000 birds off the pond and flights off the bay were bombing in. The bird boys set up our chairs and simply said..."shootem!"

Our chairs were about 20 yards apart, and they threw about 20 decoys on the edge in front of us. We would later learn the water was about 4 feet deep in the entire pond. Dave and I threw our *Cinnamon Teal* dekes out in front of us, and the hunt was on. The teal were coming from our backs and the hope was they would see the decoys and circle back. The *Shovelers* and other puddlers came directly at us... some decoying, some 20 yards up on their way to the bay.

"I was able to upgrade... If the day before belonged to the Green Wings... today was all about the Blues. Looking for nice crescent moon's was somewhat like hunting Barrow's... love it."



Unfortunately right now we are not able to bring back Black Bellied Tree Ducks over the border... so we didn't ask to target them. That said, we did say we would like to see some. I was down to 4 birds to complete my "Hunt41" list... BB Tree Duck, Fulvous Tree Duck, Mottled Duck... and a Swan. "Was" is the key word. Our guide took us to a green pepper field with a water run off and sure enough there was a pond with a few Black Bellied Whistlers on the edge. After a rather stealth sneak, both Dave and I were able to knock one down a piece... and for the first time in more than 15 years I was able to knock off a NEW SPECIES. Then... there was 3.

Rather a dull bill... but how strange?
A cross between a duck and a goose really...
cool and unique...

First bird my way was a nice *Blue Wing Teal*... I made short work of it and could tell it was a nice bird. I motioned "trophy!" and it was quickly retrieved. One minute later, I connected on another one... "trophy!" With a smile, he jumped back in the water. "Muy Frio!!!"
Then the BIG flocks of *Shoveler* came...

Wanting to keep as many birds within my control at my seat, I purposely let the birds coming at me work deep so they would drop on land. Also this time, it was drake only. I remember the first *Pintail* that came was a hen... I hear... "*Pintail*! Shootem! Shootem!" I smile and passed only to see the look of what are you doing sir!!! all over Oscar's face... I tried to explain where I come from I shoot too many *Pintails*, and a hen is definitely not on the agenda. He nodded as to understand... until another came... "*Pintail!!* Shootem! Shootem!!" Haha... He wasn't getting it. That's ok...



WDFW Commission Sets 2022-23 Washington Wolf Packs top 200 **Migratory Gamebird Seasons**

On Friday, April 8, 2022 the WDFW Fish and Wildlife Commission adopted proposals related to the 2022-2023 Migratory Gamebird Seasons and Regulations. The adopted changes included:

Two specific adjustments related to sea duck and brant:

Harlequin duck will be closed to harvest based upon results of winter aerial surveys and the compliant-component of harvest record cards indicating annual harvest is above the 5% harvest threshold per the **WDFW** Sea Duck Harvest Strategy.

The Brant season in Skagit County will start

closed as the most recent 3-year winter index has fallen below 3,000 brant. Brant season dates are shifted as late in the allowable framework window resulting in the potential open dates in Skagit County and known season dates in Clallam and Whatcom counties to move to January 21, 25, and 28, 2023.

As of Dec. 31, 2021, WDFW, partner agencies, and Tribes counted 206 wolves in 33 packs in Washington. Nineteen (19) of these were successful breeding pairs. This is up from 178 wolves in 29 packs and 16 breeding pairs in the 2020 count. The count marks the 13th consecutive year of increased wolf population in Washington, topping the 200 mark for the first time in modern history!

In 2019 and 2020, Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation (CTCR) provided numbers based on hunter, trapper, and public observation. For 2021, CTCR reverted to counting wolves through activities like track, aerial, and camera surveys — the same methods WDFW uses for the annual wolf count. As a result, numbers from the two counts have been merged together for this most recent count.

Because this is a minimum count, the actual number of wolves in Washington is higher. Since the first WDFW wolf survey in 2008, the state's wolf population has grown by an average of 25 percent per year.

Seventy-six percent (76%) of the known wolf packs in **Washington** were not involved in any known livestock depredation in 2021. Although eight (8) packs were involved in livestock depredation, six (6) of the eight (8) were involved in two (2) or fewer events each. As a result of depredations, two (2) wolves from the Columbia Pack were lethally removed in 2021; one by the **Department** and one by a landowner with a permit to lethally remove a wolf.

- Since 1980, gray wolves have been listed under state law as endangered throughout Washington.
- In January of 2021, wolves were federally **delisted** from federal Endangered Species Act (ESA) protection and **WDFW** resumed statewide management of the species.
- On February 10, 2022, wolves were federally **relisted** in the western two-thirds of the state and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) once again has the lead role in the recovery of wolves in the **North Cascades** and the **Southern Cascades** and **Northwest Coast** recovery regions.

Contributors to **WDFW's** annual wolf report include the USFWS, the National Park Service (NPS), the Spokane Tribe of Indians, and the CTCR.

WA Legislative Report

WWC is a member organization of HHC. The opinions contained in this article are entirely those of the author, and the Hunters Heritage Council (HHC).

Washington Hunters Urged To Get Involved In State Politics

I took this headline directly from an outstanding online editorial written by **Andy Walgamott** of **Northwest Sportsman Magazine** of the exact same name. The editorial focused on how hunters are losing opportunities, and the only way we are going to stop our rights form being taken away is by getting politically involved.

They quoted two (2) people specifically in this editorial — Brian Lynn from the Sportsmen's Alliance, a Spokane resident, and former WA State House Legislator and HHC Hall of Fame member Brian Blake. I am going to take some quotes from Brian Blake as contained in that editorial:

"The entire house is up this year and half the Senate," notes **Brian Blake.** "Every seat matters."

He should know. He's a former state legislator from **Aberdeen** who represented Washington's **South Coast** before being voted out of office during 2020's Republican sweep of the region.

Blake foresees another wave election building this fall and advises sportsmen harness it.

"Hunters should be door-belling for candidates and marching in parades with candidates. Work to elect legislators who can stop the anti-hunting agenda," he says.

A Democrat and multi-year Hunters Heritage Council Legislator of the Year), **Blake** was a backstop in Olympia on hunting as well as gun laws (he's an **NRA Life Endowment Member**).

"Majorities matter, I am no longer there to protect our heritage," **Blake** states. "Hunters / Conservationists need to work for the future of our heritage or not. It is their call."

"Hunters have one chance. Will they get out on the ground and work for pro-hunting/conservation candidates from August through the election?" **Blake** asks. "Elections and hunting season happen simultaneously, and hunters need to participate in both if we are to retain our heritage."

The new animal-rights (AR) umbrella group, Washington Wildlife First, is very well-funded and well-organized, and they are a threat to our hunting heritage. Hunters have to be vigilant at all three (3) levels; the Legislative level, the Commission level, and the Electioneering level. The HHC is the political arm of the hunting community with their lobbyist in Olympia. HHC has a perfect record of killing every anti-hunting bill every year of their existence. They have done the work in the Legislative arena. It would be great if the HHC had pro-hunting majorities to work with. Brian Blake hit the nail on the head — majorities matter! We in the hunting community need to work hard to elect pro-hunting legislators and put the AR community on the defensive.

The Commission fight looks tough with the three (3) new radical anti-hunting Commissioners appointed by **Governor Inslee** and combined with rabidly anti-hunting **Commissioner Lorna Smith**; the prospects look even darker. Getting involved in electing pro-hunting candidates solves this problem too. The **State Senate** is the people's check and balance against the Governor. Right now, we have an **AR** person as **Chair of the Senate Natural Resources Committee.** Elections can change that. We can bring these radical Commissioners before the state senate and remove them.

This brings me back to my main point — Hunters need to get involved with electioneering! We all need to get involved this fall and work for pro-hunting candidates.

How Was Your Season

Editor's Note: The article below is a follow-up to the previous article by Ross Barkhurst, "Continuing Eelgrass Issues in Willapa Bay Affect Waterfowl," published in the WWA January 2022 Newsletter and linked here.

Worst Ever in Willapa Bay

In addition to eelgrass being sparse, it has now succumbed to *eelgrass wasting disease*. Ducks would not touch it. Opening day some 1,000 of ducks went by. Not one turned to work decoys in the sick grass. First time ever for an opening day!

After the tops died and washed away, some regrew from roots, and we got a few ducks. About 30% of our normal season numbers. There is a little grass out there now — 100% diseased again. Trace amounts of pesticides is one of the two (2) leading causes of eelgrass wasting disease.

Great to see **WA State Senate** bill [2SSB 5619, linked <u>here</u>) to map and restore kelp and eelgrass meadows both Puget Sound and Coast. Sponsored by six (6) Democrates, it passed almost unanimously and Governor Inslee signed it and its budget into law. A multi-year phased project, with the **WA Department of Natural Resources** (**DNR**) reporting to our WA Senate annually on progress.

Thank goodness the **WA Department of Ecology** (**DOE**) and **WDFW** were not put in the lead position. Maybe we have done some good?

Appreciate **WWA's** help in publishing information. However, we still will need to pay attention that **Gray's Harbor and Willapa Bay** do not get put on bottom of a long recovery priority list. The goal of bill is to restore 10,000 acres total — **Sound** and **Outer Coast** together.

I firmly believe the **WA State Senate** now knows **WDFW** and **Ecology** would never self-start on such a recovery. **Senator Kevin Van De Wege** (D-Sequim) as **Chairman of the Senate Natural Resources & Parks Committee** and others took the lead.

Thanks again for **WWA** involvement.

The Hunter's Table

By James Ono

Pato En Mole!

I would never claim that this recipe is an authentic mole, but it seems to do the trick and is relatively easy to make. In this case, I used an Instant Pot, however it could easily be adapted for use in a crock pot, dutch oven, or stovetop pressure cooker.

It is pretty well known that the thighs and wings on a duck can be pretty tough. I have also found some recipes end up a little *gamey* when slow cooking to well done. The bold flavors of the mole sauce combine with the duck to eliminate any gaminess and create a rich, flavorful dish. I made this recipe with the thighs, legs, and wings from about 9. Add your stock to the pan/pot and scrape up any two (2) ducks, but there is enough sauce to accommodate more. I would say you could safely use legs and wings from four (4) ducks or just legs from eight (8) ducks.

Ingredients

- 4 ducks worth of legs/thighs and wings
- Oil For Searing (use a high smoke point oil. I use Canola)
- 1 Yellow Onion chopped
- 4 Cloves Garlic chopped
- 1 cup of water or stock
- 1 can of Fire-roasted diced Tomatoes
- 2 Chipotle peppers + 1 Tbsp additional adobo sauce
- ¼ cup sliced almonds
- ¼ cup raisins
- 2 Tbsp unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1 tsp Kosher Salt
- 1 tsp Cumin
- ½ tsp Ground Cinnamon; and
- Salt and Pepper





Instructions

- 1. Preheat your instant pot on sauté Hi, or preheat a skillet to med-hi and add oil to coat your pan.
- 2. Season your duck with salt and pepper
- 3. Add your duck to the pan. Be sure not to crowd the pan. Do it in batches if need be.
- 4. Brown your pieces of duck on both sides. About 3 minutes a side. You will want to see them really start to brown and caramelize.
- 5. Once done, set the duck aside.
- 6. Add the onions to the pan and sauté until softened. About 4 minutes
- 7. Add the garlic and cook until fragrant. About 30 seconds
- 8. Scrape the onions and garlic into a blender.
- browned bits.
- 10. Pour this liquid into the blender as well.
- 11. Add the tomatoes, chipotle peppers, adobo sauce, almonds, raisins, cocoa powder, salt, cumin, and cinnamon to the blender.







- 12. Blend until smooth.
- 13. Lightly coat your instant pot with oil and place the duck in.
- 14. Pour the sauce over the top of the duck. Do NOT stir.
- 15. Set your instant pot to pressure cook Hi for 12 minutes then vent. (Spoiler Alert: Here is where the recipe will differ for crock pots, dutch ovens, and stovetop pressure cookers. Unfortunately I don't have any additional guidance for these methods, but I would guess for a crockpot 6-8 hours on low and about 2 hours in a dutch oven at 325).
- 16. Pull the duck out of the sauce and set aside.
- 17. Simmer the remaining sauce for about another 10 minutes until the sauce is nice and thick.
- 18. At this point you can pick the meat off the bones or leave it on.
- 19. This recipe can be eaten right off the bone, served with rice and beans or you can pick the meat and reincorporate it into the sauce and use it for tacos, burritos, enchiladas, or nachos.



- Providing full scholarships for boys and girls to attend a week at Youth Conservation Camp on Orcas Island, WA
- Working with the WDFW in the creation of premium quality waterfowling hunt areas
- Building and rehabilitating blinds in <u>public</u> hunting areas
- Distribution and planting of thousands of pounds of donated corn seed for waterfowl consumption
- Working with the Yakama Tribe in banding upland birds and waterfowl, and building duck "blinds" on tribal lands
- Goose and duck nest counts and banding of both with the WDFW and USFWS
- Working with the WDFW on dove counts & planting WDFW food plots in Eastern WA with WWA owned tractor and farming implements
- Sponsoring of the Annual NW Decoy Collector's Show
- Participating in multiple Sportsmens' Shows annually
- Donation of funds and volunteer man hours for Swan Mortality Mitigation Studies
- Donation of funds and volunteer man hours to WDFW for goose banding and satellite tracking
- Litter pickup projects at public hunting areas, boat ramps, and along highways; and conducting multiple fund raising banquets annually to pay for all of these "hands on, boots on the ground" conservation projects.
