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

Ridgefield NWR Work Party Report

On **Saturday, June 24**th, we finished up blinds that were deferred due to nesting cranes in the vicinity of blinds #'s 8-14.

We looked at placement location for blind #5 for the **Black Box polymer pit blind** that will replace it. There is a deep depression about 10 yards closer to the shore and offset slightly to the south that should work out great for

the new blind. The blind will be installed as it currently is moving material from the original location to create an island.

We also salvaged a dog box off an aluminum pit blind that **WWA-LC** had purchased approximately 12 years ago. We replaced it several years ago with another **Black Box Pit Blind**. We will sell for salvage the ¼" aluminum blind as it was unfortunately destroyed during the removal.

Blind #3 needs metal framework supporting floor repaired and a new floor decking. **WWA-LC** will provide the materials to get the blind ready for the season.

Thanks to Chris Stalcup, Bill Goodenough, Bill Dose, Arlan Hackett, Bob Taylor, Michael Andreotti, Marlin Reinholdt and Doug Hargin for their volunteer efforts.

WWA has been invited by WDFW to participate in the annual free National Hunting and Fishing Day event (NHFD) for youth and families. This year's event will take place from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, September 30th at Camp Cowles in Newport, Washington.

WWA has joined in this event twice in the past — complete with the WWA Duck Mount Trailer Display. However both of those occasions were on the West side. Once in September of 2017 at Camp Pigott in Snohomish, and the other in September of 2019 at the Tacoma Sportsmen's Club in Puyallup.

The WWA Board of Directors has authorized the use of the Duck Mount Trailer to be brought this far East, provided we have enough volunteers to staff the booth. Unfortunately WWA-Spokane Chapter Chair John Rasmussen has a family obligation that weekend and can't attend. Please contact WWA President Paul McGovern (contact info on page 1 of this Newsletter) if you can volunteer that Saturday.

NHFD uses this event to promote outdoor recreation, safety, conservation, and good stewardship by providing hands-on hunting, fishing and conservation-related experiences and opportunities for youth and their families.

At the event, there will be many educational displays and hands-on activities sponsored by **WDFW** and other conservation groups and participants. Past activities have included trout fishing, fly tying demonstrations, rod and reel casting practice, flint knapping, and making plaster animal track casts, fish prints, seed balls and butterfly houses.

In addition, youth accompanied by a parent or guardian are invited to participate in shooting sports with department-owned archery equipment, BB-guns, air rifles, .22 rifles, and 20-gauge shotguns. They will receive training, guidance and encouragement from certified Range Safety Officers, Hunter Education Instructors and Master Hunters as well as staff and volunteers from the department's Hunter Education Program.

All youth attendees will receive a reusable drawstring bag containing several shooting and outdoor safety-related items, informational pamphlets, and will also enjoy door prize drawings and many giveaways provided by local and national retailers.

WWA Legislative News

WA Legislative Report

Editor's Note: This article is written entirely by the Hunters Heritage Council (HHC), a Washington State based organization dedicated to political action on behalf of the hunting and related communities of Washington. The Washington Waterfowl Association (WWA) had no input into this article. This article is in this newsletter because of WWA's membership in Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC). WWC is a member organization of HHC. The opinions contained in this article are entirely those of the author, and the Hunters Heritage Council (HHC).

Can People Really Be This Stupid?

"A wise man speaks because he has something to say; a fool, because he has to say something."

--Plato

In last month's Legislative Report, I wrote that the Commission's draft Conservation Policy C-700X (linked here) was criminal; it was illegal; it violated the Legislative Mandate in RCW 77.04.012, (linked here), and it changed conservation into preservation. Plato must have been talking about Commission Chair Barbara Baker when he expressed the above quote. At the last Commission meeting Chair Baker stated:

"Heck, I did not know that there was a fricking big difference between 'preservation' and 'conservation.' Did not know when (former WDFW Director of Conservation Policy) Jeff (Davis) and I condensed this. And I thought ... the fact that we say that our mandate is to preserve, yeah, that makes sense. Well, no, it's a big difference to People, and it only comes up a couple of places, but it'd be pretty easy to fix."

You are truly a fool as **Plato** said. You are the **Commission Chair**, and you don't know that preservation and conservation are different management strategies? **!!!** Preservation is an **animal-rights (A-R)** goal of no consumptive use; and conservation is something hunters and fishers have always championed. Without hunters there would be no wildlife! Someone that doesn't know the difference between preservation and conservation, and says that it's no big deal isn't fit to serve on the

Commission. That statement shows her incredible bias against the consumptive-use community.

More about **Commission draft Policy C-700X**, and another pearl of wisdom from our illustrious **Chair Barbara Baker**:

"We're gonna have to have discussions about what that means to the people who were yelling at us today or yesterday, because it fuels their fear where possibly it isn't warranted. We aren't going to turn our lands into parks. That's not what the intention of this, is. Maybe it is, maybe I just don't know. So that's a discussion we have to have."

What kind of doublespeak is that? Of course, your goal is to turn lands into parks, and eliminate all consumptive use. That's why every consumptive user group saw through your scheme. You are not smarter than us, **Barbara Baker.** We see right through you. You are like the *Emperor's New Clothes*, and it's an ugly sight.

Commissioner Lorna Smith, another one of our brain surgeon Commissioners — and the most anti-hunting **Commissioner** — had this pearl of wisdom:

"The message seems to be getting out that we have this hidden secret agenda, and it's gonna upset everybody's apple cart. And that seemed to be a very pervasive message with a certain part of our audience. Not the majority, but a significant minority. And is there a way to correct, set the record straight, so to speak, on that?"

Commissioner Smith knows full well — that draft Conservation Policy C-700X WAS worked on in secret with little or no public input. Plato was so right about you too.

We in the consumptive use community are the vast majority, not the minority.

Less than 1% of Americans support the animal-rights (A-R) radical agenda, while 78% of Washingtonians support the right to hunt.

Your math is as bad as your logic, **Lorna.** We as hunters aren't going to give up, and we will **NEVER** accept **draft Conservation Policy C-700X.** We will never accept our way of life being taken away from us.

Legislative Report Continued

WDFW Deputy Director Amy Windrope believes mixed signals are being sent out by Fish and Wildlife Commissioners that oversee the policy. To quote her:

"Which is why I think it ... gives the sense that people are being a little bit manipulated, depending on where they are sitting. When we first talked about the Conservation Policy [on Thursday], Chair Baker and the Director [Kelly Susewind] talked about how this is in alignment with what we're doing now. And then when people talked about what it means, then, you know, **Commissioner** Rowland talked about, 'This is overarching, it's gonna change what we do.' And there's a sort of a breadth of it. So, which is it? And I think people struggle to know: 'Are you changing everything, or are you just stating what you're doing with small tweaks?' And I think we haven't been clear about it. And I think different commissioners are seeing it differently, which leads, I think, to people to be worried."

More doublespeak! Of course, you haven't been clear on it. This isn't small tweaks; this is draconian change that obliterates the hunting and fishing communities. Where is the transparency, **Amy?** We have every right to be worried, and we are worried! We are going to fight and to quote the title of the *Twisted Sister* song, "*We're Not Going to Take it Anymore!*" Another time Plato was right.

Strangely enough, **draft Conservation Policy C-700X** will not be voted on until its October 26-28 meetings in Olympia. This is after the **WWC** lawsuit is scheduled to go to trial on October 13, 2023, in **Thurston County Superior Court.**

I don't want to sound like a broken record, or that I am putting people on a guilt trip. That is not my intention, and I am sorry if it ever comes across that way. I am just very passionate for the cause.

Ross Barkhurst, Put his Knowledge, Experience on the Commission

Since at least 2015 **WWA Board** and **Life Member, Ross Barkhurst,** has been sounding the alarm about the deteriorating ecosystem in his back yard of **Willapa Bay.** He has previously written extensive articles on this issue in the **WWA**Newsletter — "Life in the Dead Zone—The 2015 Eelgrass Die Off" in September of 2015 linked here, and "Continuing

Eelgrass Issues in Willapa Bay Affect Waterfowl" more recently in January of 2022 and linked here.



The WDFW Commission is well acquainted with the science talents of Ross. In 2019 used his major degree in Oceanography to study and understand circulation and effects of water in Willapa Bay. At request of the WDFW Commission Chair, Ross formed the citizen's advisory group Willapa Basin Ecosystem Review Team (WBERT) which in turn the submitted the "WBERT Report" with seven (7) recommendations for habitat improvement in Willapa Bay based on the best science available. Unfortunately there was no response by WDFW to the WBERT reports, and subsequently the waterfowl numbers in Willapa Bay have crashed.

Ross has frequented Willapa Bay since the late 1970's when he purchased land there. He has lived on the bay full time since his retirement in 2002. Despite his efforts over the years as Vice Chair of the Columbia County Oregon Planning Commission and serving on the Pacific County Marine Resource Committee, he unfortunately has continued to witness the slow, ecological degradation of the bay. "On the Commission I would be better able to apply my experience, education, and knowledge not only to Willapa Bay, but to the entire Outer Washington Coast in Toto," Ross says.

Education & Employment Background: Born in March of 1945, Ross grew up in southern Oregon; graduated the US Naval Academy in 1967 followed by six years in US Navy Nuclear Submarine Service. Ross spent his civilian working career in the nuclear industry from system engineer at Trojan Nuclear Plant; to Plant Manager and Vice President at the Waterford Three Nuclear Plant in Louisiana; to President and CEO of the Vermont Yankee Nuclear Power Corp.

Fishing and Hunting Background:

Ross describes himself as "a conservation and habitat person first—a fishing and waterfowl observation and hunting person, second." While working in the South, Ross was President of Louisiana Tarpon Club where he successfully advocated for "tag and release" Tarpon contests, not just kill and weigh-in.

Ross has fished the Lower Columbia River, Multnomah Channel, and Willamette River "since age 15." While stationed in Idaho in the Navy, Ross learned a lot about Sage Grouse and other upland birds "which need to be kept in the Commission's mind in Eastern WA.," he says.

Goose Banding in Whatcom Co.

Thank You For Upping Our Learning Curve

We want to thank everyone involved from the WWA Corp President WDFW especially biologist Matt Wilson who was very



gracious to allow some of our **WWA** members to assist his teams. Matt took the time to show us the molting wing feather barbs(?) where the primary flight feathers fall out, and actually had us feel the hot temperature from the blood working to restore the feathering.

He also demonstrated inspecting tail tips having split feathers that indicated a juvenile bird. We also learned about synchronous molting (for Geese and all waterfowl) vs. *asynchronous* molting (prey birds). This results in flightless birds if **synchronous.** They lose all flight feathers at once. During molting, an

asynchronous bird only loses some flight feathers.

In late June, a few **WDFW** biologists, some wildlife managers from the Lumi Nation, and even one game warden took advantage of the molting season and made a trip to Whatcom County for some summer banding work. WWA-NW Chapter Chair, Rick Billeau, WWA-Whatcom County Chapter Chair, Lyle Galloway, and I were invited to attend and participate and assist in this important work.

We all corralled **Greater Canada geese** by slowly moving them into holding pens and since they were molting and thus can't fly this time of year, we gently walked them into some cozy fenced areas. From there we checked them for adult vs. juvenile birds and determined gender to assign the correct band type. This information will be useful for data collection when the birds are later harvested and reported by hunters or recaptured on any future repeated banding events.

We did in fact find many of the birds we handled to have previous existing bandings, and those bird's band numbers were recorded for data analysis. One had a band so old and worn that where it was impossible to read the number code so we removed the old band and fitted the bird with a brand new band.

Lastly he showed us the gender ID process which is time consuming and tedious. There were many lighter moments, laughs and some exclamations when a big bull goose bit me on my neck and let me know how he felt about this scientific event! lol Best of all — No geese were harmed, and all the birds gathered back together when we released the last of the flocks.

Also a big thanks to WDFW Whatcom County biologist Callie Moore for inviting the WWA to help out with the event.

Fish and Wildlife Commission Seeks Public Comment on Draft Policies for Willapa Bay Salmon, Forage Fish Management

OLYMPIA – July 10th — The Washington Fish and Wildlife Commission is seeking public input on possible revisions to its Willapa Bay Salmon Management and statewide Forage Fish Management policies.

The Willapa Bay Salmon Management Policy provides guidance to the WDFW to promote conservation of salmon in Willapa Bay as well as the economic well-being and stability of commercial and recreational fishing in Washington. First adopted in 2015, the policy underwent a comprehensive review in 2018, and a formal policy revision process began in 2020.

Since that time, the **Commission** has held numerous meetings to discuss and collect public input on possible



revisions and updates to the policy. The final draft policy is now available for public review and comment.

To learn more or submit a comment on the Willapa Bay Salmon Management Policy, visit WDFW's webpage or the comment portal. Comments may also be emailed directly to willapabay@dfw.wa.gov.

The **Forage Fish Management Policy** provides statewide guidance for **WDFW** to maintain healthy populations of forage fish species and individual stocks of forage fish while assuring the integrity of ecosystems and habitats.




Overall, the boat caught 18 keepers on the outing. Just 4 short of a 12 man limit for the day!

Urban Nest Box Update

Saturday June 24th I headed out from the Bothell landing to check four wood duck boxes for nesting activity. I launched and checked the two boxes along the Sammamish River Slough with *Mabel*, my 3-year-old GSP (German Shorthaired Pointer, for those of you "Labs-Only" waterfowlers). She had a great time running around finding sticks and making some water retrieves.

The first two boxes had successful hatches and I was happy to find some remaining egg membranes. The first box appeared to have five (5) membranes from the hatch as well as one unhatched egg. The second box had what appeared to be nine (9) membranes and looked like a great hatch. The first two nests are getting more branches growing around them to protect the 4x4 post-mounted boxes. I believe this may be helping.

I then decided to boat down river to **Kenmore** and check the two brand-new boxes just installed late this nesting season. There was no activity in either of the two nests. It maybe that they need more time or maybe I picked a spot the ducks disapprove of. My dog had fun and jumped into the water about 10 times in the 2 mile trip and enjoyed her dog paddling dips along the route.

I also attempted to check some nest boxes up at **Debays Slough** on another road trip. This trip was a total bust as the water levels were very low. I checked the one near the parking lot and the mosquitos tried to pick me up and carry me away. Iol I hope to go back with some bug spray and a machete to get through to the other boxes on land.

The Hunter's Table

By James Ono

Wild Duck with Cherry Wine Sauce

Nothing says summer like fresh, local cherries. I really loved being able to incorporate them into a wild game dish. The sweetness and acidity that the reduced wine and cherry bring, liven the dish works well with the richness of the duck meat. I use cabernet, but you can use a 12. Slice the duck breast and plate with sauce on top wine of your choice. I also quartered my cherries and removed the pit. The smaller pieces were a good size for each bite and helped them to soften through easily.

I highly recommend using skin on duck breasts as you need fat to help make the sauce thicker and smooth.

If you use skinless duck breasts, add a couple tablespoons of butter.

Ingredients

- 4 duck breasts (skin on)
- High smoke point cooking oil
- Salt
- Pepper
- 1 shallot diced
- 1 cup dry red wine
- ½ cup game, beef, or chicken
- 2 tablespoons of Worcestershire
- 8 oz of cherries (pitted)
- ½ tsp thyme

Instructions

- 1. Preheat your pan over medium high heat;
- 2. Season your duck breast with salt and pepper;
- 3. Sear your duck breast for about 4 minutes a side or to your liking (I temp check and pull at around 120-125);
- 4. Remove the duck breasts to a cutting board and tent loosely with foil;

- 5. There should be fat left in the pan, (if it is less than 2 Tbsp, supplement with butter);
- 6. Add the shallot to the fat and cook until soft and translucent:
- 7. Add the wine to the pan and allow to reduce by half;
- 8. Continue to stir to get up any browned bits from the bottom of the pan;
- 9. Add the stock, Worcestershire, cherries, and thyme;
- 10. Allow this to reduce by about half and the cherries are soft;
- 11. Taste the sauce and add salt as needed; and




