# WA Legislative Report

Editor's Note: This article is written entirely by the Hunters Heritage Council (HHC), a Washington State based organization dedicated to political action on behalf of the hunting and related communities of Washington. The Washington Waterfowl Association (WWA) had no input into this article. This article is in this newsletter is because of WWA's membership in Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC). WWC is a member organization of HHC. The opinions contained in this article are entirely those of the author, and the Hunters Heritage Council (HHC).

# **Commission is Criminal**

Man or woman, Young or old, Crime is a cancer, That must be destroyed.

#### -- The Shadow

Point blank, the proposed **Commission Draft policy C-700X** — linked <u>here</u> — is criminal. It is illegal. It overrides **RCW 77.04.012**, the legislative mandate linked <u>here</u>, and makes consumptive use illegal. The **Washington Administrative Code (WAC)** cannot override the **Revised Code of Washington (RCW)**, yet this **Commission** is trying to do so. This has to be stopped at all costs!

> For the first time in its history, the Commission meeting will be held in Seattle so that the animal-rights (A-R) people can stack the Commission meeting.

To date there has been very little publicity for this proposed change to the **WAC**, and for the first time in history the **Commission** meeting will be held in **Seattle** so that the **animal-rights (A-R)** people can stack the **Commission** meeting. There has been no publicity for this Commission meeting. This draft change to the 25-year strategic plan was announced on the **Internet** on June 2, 2023, and it will be voted on June 19, 2023, just 17 days later! Having this voted on so soon is criminal.

This is from the proposed **Conservation Policy C-700X:** 

"<u>Principles</u>:

- Conservation first The WDFW's top priority is the conservation of Washington's fish, shellfish, and wildlife for the benefit of all state residents, current and future. Successful conservation is the foundation to support the spectrum of values that Washington residents hold regarding providing sustainable recreational and commercial opportunities including, but not limited to, hunting, fishing, and wildlife appreciation.
- Conservation of all species, habitat, and ecosystems To preserve functioning, resilient, healthy ecosystems, the WDFW shall strive to conserve all fish, shellfish, and wildlife, whether rare or common, and their habitat. Doing so is essential to maintain species diversity.
- 3) Conservation partnerships An ecosystem—based conservation strategy requires strong coordination and cooperation with local, state, federal, and tribal governments, non- governmental organizations, private landowners, academia, businesses, and engaged citizens. Collaboration with neighboring states and Canada also is important because Fish and Wildlife distributions are not constrained by political boundaries.
- 4) Knowledge and science WDFW actions and decisions shall be based on objective, science—based knowledge. Scientific efforts to inform the WDFW must be sufficiently broad and multi-disciplinary, combining all related scientific fields (e.g., biological, ecological, economic, and social). Adaptive management is a critical and required step to implement actions learned from monitoring the decisions and actions against the results. Adaptive management thus informs necessary changes to meet the desired outcomes."

Let's translate this from **Commission** talk.

**Principle One** will put an end to hunting and consumptive use, with the title "conservation or preservation" first. This **Commission** will push their goals of wildlife appreciation ahead of hunting. They showed this with eliminating a spring bear hunt in both 2022 and again in 2023, despite **WDFW** biologists, staff, and **Director**, **Kelly Susewind**, himself, recommending a hunting season.

"Successful conservation is the foundation to support the spectrum of values that **Washington** residents hold" is a buzz word that that the **Commission** will use to argue that most Washingtonians don't hunt and fish, and therefore don't support it. (Continued on Page 4)

# **Legislative News Continued**

**Principle Two**: "To preserve functioning, resilient, healthy ecosystems, the **WDFW** shall strive to conserve all fish, shellfish, and wildlife, whether rare or common, and their habitat. Doing so is essential to maintain species diversity." **Translation**: **WDFW** will move to a department that preserves species, instead of one that serves hunters and fishers.

**<u>Principle Three</u>**: "Conservation partnerships — An ecosystem—based conservation strategy requires strong coordination and cooperation with local, state, federal, and tribal governments, non-governmental organizations, private landowners, academia, businesses, and engaged citizens. Collaboration with neighboring states and **Canada** also is important because Fish and Wildlife distributions are not constrained by political boundaries."

<u>**Translation**</u>: Collaboration with everybody but the hunting and fishing community!

<u>Principle Four</u>: "WDFW actions and decisions shall be based on objective, science—based knowledge. Scientific efforts to inform the WDFW must be sufficiently broad and multi-disciplinary, combining all related scientific fields." <u>Translation</u>: This is to make sure we include **animal-rights** (A-R) "feel good" science.

### This is "Principle Seven

7) Aligning mandate, strategy, staff, and budget — To achieve the mandate expressed in RCW 77.04.012, the WDFW must develop the necessary strategies, enlist the necessary staff, and secure the necessary resources. To that end, the WDFW must strengthen its communications to the public, state Legislature, and Governor regarding the need for expanded partnerships, <u>additional authorities</u>, and funding." [Emphasis Added].

If there is any doubt that the **Commission** is trying to override the legislative mandate, **Principle Seven** should eliminate that doubt. Plain as daylight, **ADDITIONAL AUTHORITITIES** to bring back the legislative mandate. This is just plain criminal.

This must be stopped at all costs! We can testify before the **Commission** until we're blue in the face, and it won't do a bit of good. The **Democrats** in the **Washington State Legislature** won't lift a finger to help. The only way to stop this is by suing the **Commission**, and "**Mark**" my words [pun intended], this is going to happen.

WE HAVE TO DESTROY THIS POLICY!

# The Time is Now!

I go back about twenty years ago when two of my very best friends from the **Washington Cattlemen Association** and I met with one of the top natural resource attorneys in the country. We are complaining that we win in the **Legislature**, but we get nowhere with the **Commission or WDFW.** This was before the wolf plan was passed, but there was still major problems with predator-prey relationships. Hunters and ranchers shared plenty of common interests.


The attorney's advice was simple —the hunting community never sues... This attorney said that because of this, no one respects or fears the hunting community...

The attorney's advice was simple —the hunting community never sues. The **animal-rights (A-R)** groups always sue; the environmental groups always sue; the tribes sue; but the hunters have never sued. This attorney said that because of this, no one respects or fears the hunting community; if the hunting community even filed an intent to sue that would change everything.

For years I have thought, what can we file on? When I became **President of Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC)**, I thought that predators were so out of control in this state, maybe filing a lawsuit on bad science, but a science versus science lawsuit is extremely difficult to win.

Then we came up to this Governor Jay Inslee. When he was in Congress, he was the most animal-right's (A-R) member of Congress the ten years that he was there, according to the Congressional Sportsmen's Foundation. As governor, he and his Senior Policy Advisor for Natural Resources at that time, JT Austin, stacked the Commission with animal-rights (A-R) activists. Neither Governor Inslee, nor **JT Austin**, communicated with the hunting community, and for the first time in the history of the Commission the commercial fishermen were left without representation. The animal-rights (A-R) people had five (5) solid votes on the Commission — a controlling block, but more importantly, a violation of **RCW 77.04.040** (linked here), the balance doctrine of the Commission and the outreach doctrine of the **RCW**. This controlling block has violated the legislative mandate in **RCW 77.04.012** (full statute linked <u>here</u>) to "maximize the public recreational game fishing and hunting opportunities of all citizens." They've done this over and over in their actions and speech. We have most recently seen this with spring bear with the permanent elimination of spring bear hunting, when science says that there is a robust bear population allowing for a spring bear hunting season supported by the **Department's** science. This criminal **Conservation Policy C-700x** cannot be tolerated.

#### Lawsuit Filed

As of Wednesday morning, June 14th, Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC) has filed a lawsuit in Thurston County Superior Court. Governor Jay Inslee, Commissioners Barbara Baker, Lorna Smith, Melanie Rowland, Tim Ragen, and John Lehmkuhl, and WDFW as a department, are the named defendants. ### **Translation of Legalese 101**

### **Petition for Quo Warranto**

A **Petition for Quo Warranto** is a legal remedy used to challenge a person's right to hold a public or corporate office. The term **"quo warranto"** is Latin for **"by what warrant" or authority.** This [legal action] is used to challenge the legitimacy of the holder of substantive public office.

### <u>Writ of Mandamus</u>

A Writ of Mandamus is a court order to an inferior government official to properly fulfill their official duties or correct an abuse of discretion. **It is an order by a court** to a lesser government official to perform an act required by law, which he/she has refused or neglected to do.

#### **Declaratory Relief**

Also commonly known as declaratory judgment refers to a court's declaratory judgment stating the rights of parties without ordering any specific action or listing awards for damages.

### **Injunctive Relief**

Injunctive Relief is a way to force a party to follow the terms of a contract. It is a remedy that is available in cases where the terms of a contract are not clear. It is usually granted in through an injunction — a court order to compel a party to follow the terms of the contract.

# Northwest Chapter News

Driving through the region it's good to see all the waterfowl that are in our area nesting or on the return migration. I wasn't living in this state 50 years ago, but I can just imagine the difference in the abundance of waterfowl then as compared to now. One of the primary reasons for the reduced bird count is the reduction of food sources available. These food sources support both nesting production and migrating waterfowl.

See related article by **NW Chapter** member, **Art Kendall**, on the adjacent **Page 7**. The well written piece accurately conveys the message that a significant reduction in foraging crops has taken place over last several years due to restoration initiatives in direct conflict with waterfowl conservation. Currently **NO** alternatives exist for acquiring new property, including forage-only property, and there is **NO** established waterfowl conservation policy in place.

The only thing that has changed since the graphic accompanying **Art's** piece was initially produced is a minor change in the remaining farmed acreage.

According to **WDFW**, the current crop planting for the **Skagit Wildlife Area (SWA)** is approximately:

- Farmed Island (west Island) = 10 acres corn, 30 acres Millet
- Samish Unit/Samish River = 205 acres (5+ acres Fava Beans)
- Debay Reserve = 23 acres, Debay = 20+ acres
- Bayview sites = 15+ acres

The Washington Migratory Bird Stamp and Art Program is a major source of funding for annual grain farming on several WDFW Managed Wildlife Areas in our state to provide winter forage efforts for migratory birds. Purchasing Washington State Migratory Bird Stamps (aka "Duck Stamps") or Migratory Bird Stamp artwork is an investment in Washington's wetlands, waterfowl, and other migratory bird resources.

# Salmon Restoration Has Taken Your SWA Farmland

Fellow WWA members:

I want you to realize what has happened to farming for ducks at the **WDFW Skagit Wildlife Area (SWA)**. This has happened over several years, and at least some of you are already quite aware of the situation. Bottom line is that

It has been my understanding that the primary objectives of duck management in Washington on the East side is to increase mallard nesting — on the West side to provide winter forage. The severe reduction in farming on **WDFW lands** around **Skagit Bay** significantly diminishes the amount of food available for ducks in the region in winter, to say nothing of what it does regarding hunting for ducks in the area.

Purchase of replacement lands has not been successful, nor will it be at today's prices for rural acreage. Maybe long term leases are the only available option to

almost 1200 acres used to be farmed. Currently less than 100 acres is put under the plow.

Waterfowlers have given up 1100 prime acres of winter waterfowl feeding areas in the name of **salmon restoration!** 

Of course some of those acres were dikes, hedgerows and ditches, but all were part of

correct this problem, but don't hold your breath. Either remedy will take more money than is available through "duck stamps."

As I see things, the only possible remedy is organized waterfowlers finally standing firm and demanding meaningful

a landscape that was ideal for ducks and for duck hunting. There is no replacement for this lost source of nourishment for ducks in winter.

Remember when we could hunt pheasants at Skagit wisely. Headquarters and Leque Island? No more. Absolutely NO walk-in hunting is left! The 94 acres of farmed land that is left is part of the Snow Goose Reserve, and <u>closed</u> to hunting. Commi remedia should



mitigation for these lost lands. Funding for restoration of the **Farmed Island** has already been awarded. Waterfowlers need to make sure that money is spent wisely.

Bottom line: WWA should ask the WDFW Commission and the Waterfowl Division to seek other remedies for this dire situation. If that fails, the WWA should go directly to the Washington Legislature.

### Wild Goose (err, Turkey) Chase

At O'Dark hundred hours on the most infamous day of the year, April 15th, I blithely set out to bag a belligerent tom turkey. My chosen ground was a private, forested acreage listed on the WDFW's Private Lands Access website. The website is linked here.

The property was just over the **Clark County** line in Skamania County and listed "upland birds" as one of the huntable species. In hindsight, I should have listened to a WDFW Employee, friend of mine who warned that no turkey siting had ever been verified in Clark County! But I kept telling myself that this was Skamania County

though just barely — and looked very promising on Google Maps.

The property allowed no preseason scouting, but the land adjoined a Weyerhaeuser forest on which I had purchased a hiking permit so the pups, and I had spent some time trekking and glassing the place from Weyerhaeuser's acreage prior to the turkey season opener.

Everything looked favorable. The private property included a mixture of mature forest interspersed with newly logged clearcuts and some grasslands. Two creeks ran through it on their way to the Columbia, and there was a large lake belonging to a camp just across the property line. In addition, powerlines ran through the southern end creating a cleared opening in which I knew turkeys liked to travel. Things looked promising!

Loaded down with bow and broadheads, turkey vest stuffed with a plethora of calls of which I was proficient with none; hen and jake turkey decoys; and KUIU gear sufficient to combat any type of weather **Mother Nature** might inflict; I ventured forth full of hope. As I stumbled through the pre-dawn murk, what I could see by light of my headlamp looked very promising. Old elk sign was everywhere.

A cougar had prowled the overgrown logging road along which I groped. Deer sign was plentiful too, but I looked in vain for any turkey droppings. My attempt to reach the power lines was thwarted by a combination of unmapped marsh and blackberry thickets, so I found a clearing, set out my dekes, and began squeaking what I hoped was an irresistible lonely hen call. The sun came up, birds chirped, mosquitoes swarmed, but nary an answer came to my "irresistible" call.

To my surprise, while loading up, another pickup came up the little used dirt road and stopped next to me. The driver asked how I'd done, and I confessed I'd not seen nor heard anything that resembled a turkey.

He then informed me that he and his wife had an abode up this deserted road another half mile or so and that in the 25 years that they'd lived in those woods they had never seen a turkey! "Plenty of grouse", he said, "but no gobblers." Noted.

Guess I should have paid more attention to my **WDFW** friend!

# Ross Barkhurst, Put his Knowledge, Experience on the Commission

Since at least 2015 WWA Board and Life Member, Ross Barkhurst, has been sounding the alarm about the deteriorating ecosystem in his back yard of Willapa Bay. He has previously written extensive articles on this issue in the WWA Newsletter — "Life in the Dead Zone—The 2015 Eelgrass Die Off" in September of 2015 linked here, and "Continuing"



*Eelgrass Issues in Willapa Bay Affect Waterfowl"* more recently in January of 2022 and linked <u>here</u>.

The WDFW Commission is well acquainted with the science talents of Ross. In 2019 used his major degree in Oceanography to study and understand circulation and effects of water in Willapa Bay. At request of the WDFW Commission Chair, Ross formed the citizen's advisory group Willapa Basin Ecosystem Review Team (WBERT) which in turn the submitted the "WBERT Report" with seven (7) recommendations for habitat improvement in Willapa Bay based on the best science available. Unfortunately there was no response by WDFW to the WBERT reports, and subsequently the waterfowl numbers in Willapa Bay have crashed.

Ross has frequented Willapa Bay since the late 1970's when he purchased land there. He has lived on the bay full time since his retirement in 2002. Despite his efforts over the years as Vice Chair of the Columbia County Oregon Planning Commission and serving on the Pacific County Marine Resource Committee, he unfortunately has continued to witness the slow, ecological degradation of the bay. "On the Commission I would be better able to apply my experience, education, and knowledge not only to Willapa Bay, but to the entire Outer Washington Coast <u>in Toto</u>," Ross says.

Education & Employment Background: Born in March of 1945, Ross grew up in southern Oregon; graduated the US Naval Academy in 1967 followed by six years in US Navy Nuclear Submarine Service. Ross spent his civilian working career in the nuclear industry from system engineer at Trojan Nuclear Plant; to Plant Manager and Vice President at the Waterford Three Nuclear Plant in Louisiana; to President and CEO of the Vermont Yankee Nuclear Power Corp.

### Fishing and Hunting Background:

**Ross** describes himself as "a conservation and habitat person first — a fishing and waterfowl observation and hunting person, second." While working in the South, **Ross** was **President of Louisiana Tarpon Club** where he successfully advocated for *"tag and release"* **Tarpon** contests, not just kill and weigh-in.

Ross has fished the Lower Columbia River, Multnomah Channel, and Willamette River "since age 15." While stationed in Idaho in the Navy, Ross learned a lot about Sage Grouse and other upland birds "which need to be kept in the Commission's mind in Eastern WA.," he says.

# Update on Habitat Issues in the Willapa Bay Estuary

**<u>Editor's Note</u>:** The following is input from Ross to the WDFW Fish Committee on May 23rd.

Since the Willapa Basin Ecosystem Review Team (WBERT) reported to the Commission several years ago, there has been no response, and no action, where called for. It is now clear that the *Einstein* definition of insanity (you keep repeating the same thing expecting a different result) is not appropriate here. What we have experienced is different.

The **Department** and past **Fish Committee** leadership has repeatedly degraded and repeated the same approach in the past, and were satisfied with the same results. The involvement of non-commercial minded advisors in policy creation and implementation was a problem with this approach. So the Advisors were eliminated. When the **Commission** asked **Ron Warren** why, he responded with words to the effect "that the advisors were getting older, and he had developed a way of getting a lot more input from the public via **North of Falcon (NOF).**"

We are getting older, as is **Mr Warren** — who is now getting TWO paychecks (retirement and consultant) to advise on implementation of **Hatchery Policy**, so we understand. And of course he and previous **Fish Committee** leadership were instrumental in *Removing Best Available Science* from the **Hatchery Policy!** Replaced with "*defensible science.*" In other words, the public may think this is a conservation train wreck, and they [the **Fish Committee**] would be happy to fight with the public over the wreckage.

The **pHOS** and **pNOB** acid disasters for **Chinook** in **Willapa Bay** are well documented, and nothing is being changed to resolve it. The same **pHOS** and **pNOB** acid disasters for **Chinook** are well documented in the **Nasalle River** drainage — where highest wild Chinook goals exist and nothing is being done to resolve it. Most of that river is closed to the only method of selective harvest — sport fishing. Hatchery management knows the new weir will not fix this. The **Johnson Creek** experience shows **pNOB** acid is even more key than **pHOS** acid, and this is hopeless under any **Willapa** scenarios contemplated.

I have attended all hearings re **Willapa** eelgrass spraying, and **WDFW** has expressed no concerns about

continuing to spray vegetation. Every year the flats are browner, and so-called "protected" **Z marina eelgrass** is more diseased where not gone altogether.

The **Habitat Committee** needs to get aggressive over **estuarine Willapa Habitat**. It is an unmitigated disaster! I have attended some **NOF** meetings since **Ron Warren** claimed more public input, and the opposite is true. The first **Willapa NOF** had one conservation and sport fisher speak other than myself. He was told he had sent a detailed complaint to the **Commission** and would not be allowed to discuss that in **NOF!** These meetings are routinely ended before the allotted time is up, even with hands still raised.

WDFW has no problem with spraying vegetation in herring spawning beds. As you know herring spawning mass has gone from over 400 tons to zero in our [Willapa] estuary! I can document loss of major *Z marina* beds, and have pictures. When US District Court found Army Corps [of Engineers] shell fish permits illegal, they were ordered to check with WDFW regularly to ask about any illegal loss of ecological function under any new permit. Have they checked? What were they told?

When I asked what areas were sprayed the last three years and who sprayed them, I was told by **Ecology** to **Freedom of Information (FOIA)** it! I only asked because they removed that info from their website where it was always reported.

This May the **Nemah Flats** and others North are the brownest I have ever seen in May in 40 years. Sediment transport has become a major problem, and we can no longer grow oysters on bottom in our commercial bed at **Nemah.** 

In the Ocean Shores meeting, the former Fish Committee leader stated that I had talked with the Conservation Director and resolved my issues. This was totally false! None have been resolved and now sediment transport is off the scale. [The herbicide] *Imazamox* has a two-year half life in sediment, documented, and goes everywhere on the high-energy eastside of bay, which previously teamed with birds including waterfowl.

The green crab explosion, where their young prey has no place to hide, should be no puzzle. The **US District Court** has finally taken action to shut down the **SW Alaska** commercial take of **Chinook** going forward. Now, more of our larger wild **Chinook** can make it **south to WA and OR**. Without a **Department** sea change in salmon management, including harvest and habitat, results will be negligible. *(Continued on Page 18)*

# **Complete Hunter Ed Before Fall**

OLYMPIA The **Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW)** reminds hunters to complete mandatory hunter education courses before the fall hunting seasons.

"Hunter education courses in the fall fill quickly with people trying to certify before their chosen hunting seasons," said **Dave Whipple, WDFW Hunter Education Section Manager.** "We encourage hunters to register for a course sooner, ideally over the summer, instead of rushing to complete the requirement shortly before the seasons open."

WDFW discontinued its fully remote hunter education courses effective June 1.

The **Department** offers fully in-person hunter education courses as well as hybrid courses that combine online and in-person learning. The traditional classroom course, which is typically taught over multiple evenings and includes a field portion, is highly recommended for students seeking a valuable classroom experience.

The hybrid course combines successful completion of an online course followed by a field skills evaluation where students receive hands-on training and evaluation by certified instructors.

Per Washington state law, all hunters born after Jan. 1, 1972 must complete a hunter education course in order to buy a hunting license. A hunter education deferral is available for hunters 10 years of age and older who want to try hunting with an eligible licensed hunter before completing a hunter education course themselves.

To learn about hunter education requirements and find an upcoming course near you, please visit the **WDFW** hunter education website.

### Applications Open for Positions on Waterfowl Advisory Group (WAG)

OLYMPIA **WDFW** is accepting nominations to a citizen advisory group that advises the **Department** on waterfowl management issues.

This group provides important input on waterfowl hunting regulations, public lands access, and wetland enhancement projects funded by the state duck stamp." said Kyle Spragens, WDFW Waterfowl Section Manager.

WDFW Director Kelly Susewind will appoint members to the WDFW Waterfowl Advisory Group (WWAG) for three-year terms beginning Aug.1, 2023.

The **WAG** holds at least one single-day meeting each year. Members are eligible to be reimbursed by **WDFW** for travel expenses to attend meetings.

# **History of WWA Life Membership**






