No, make that MANY KUDOS to our Ilwaco and Gray's Harbor Chapter members, our friends at Delta Waterfowl, WA State Senator Hatfield and Representatives Blake & Takko, the Pacific County Commissioners, The **Cranberry Growers Association,** hunters and recreationalists, and especially **U.S Representative Jaime Herrera-Beutler** for their efforts to keep the **USFWS** from removing the dikes and thus destroying the Willapa National Wildlife Refuge, at least for the time being.

In December, Representative Herrera-Beutler and her staff were the driving force behind overwhelming (2 to 1) bi-partisan votes in both the US Senate and US House directing the **USFWS** to refrain from their plans to remove the levee system and flood the refuge until April of 2012. The Representative is committed stopping this project in light of local communities' strong opposition.

The Legal Column

Willapa National Wildlife Refuge

(Pacific County)

The U.S. Congress included language in the federal appropriations bill for entire **U.S. Fish and Wildlife (USFWS)** making it clear that none of this year's monies appropriated shall be used for the dike removal fish restoration project. This may not be a permanent fix, but allows more time for our coalition of concerned interests to make further advances. In addition, the former **Willapa NWR manager, Charlie Stenvall**, was re-assigned. We'll keep working on it.

Thurston County Marine Shoreline

(Yes, the whole shoreline)

No Shoot Zone

Not a word was heard!

It still concerns us that the county has not contacted our only County-appointed representative on the 12-person work group that was established by the County to debate this issue. We will continue to monitor this and are prepared to file an immediate appeal should the ordinance be passed without further modifications.

Legue Island Fish Restoration & North Legue Island Wetland Mitigation

(Snohomish County)

Salmon Recovery Funding (SRF) monies were allocated for Ducks Unlimited to complete some form of a groundwater investigation to address concerns of saltwater intrusion into the adjacent drinking water aquifer. Interestingly, a detailed plan has not been shared with the Juniper Beach Water District, and no communication has been provided regarding whether the study has started or not. Our consolidated appeal of the Hydraulic Project Approval (HPA) related to North Leque Island was denied by the Pollution Control Hearings Board (now the Environmental Land Use Hearings Office). But, the HPA permit expired, and they applied for a renewal of the HPA permit...so we appealed the new HPA permit process. The difference is we now have two new partners.

Our filing of the legal action in Superior Court is still moving forward and becoming more involved.

Next NW Chapter Meeting

There will be **no NW Chapter meeting in February** as it falls on Valentine's Day and we want all your valentines to be happy so you can hunt and fish the rest of the year. Our **next meeting will be March 13**, 7 PM at the Conway Fire Hall. Our guest speaker will be Bill Geer from the Theodore Roosevelt Conservation Association. He is a biologist that has put together a DVD on how global warming may affect fish and wildlife and our hunting and fishing opportunities. Let's fill the room for him as he is coming all the way from Montana.

Youth Hunt Program

We have one, and maybe two members interested in coordinated some youth hunting for our **NW Chapter.** If you are interested in helping out next year for the youth hunt weekend and organizing some youth hunts throughout the season, let **Rone** know via email or phone. We will be working toward getting access to a few private blinds just for some youth hunts.

Farmed Island

Well, we knew it was coming. The **Puget Sound Nearshore Partnership** has put out a priority list of fish restoration sites, and the **WDFW Farmed Island** is on it.

They have a 5% or 10% design and have it prioritized with a bunch of other projects across Puget Sound. If **WWA** wants to fight this and try to save the island or possibly get mitigation, we need some folks to get involved.

This is a really really hard pill to swallow after spending 5 years working on alternatives and completing a \$3,250,000 project that saved the fields back in 1996-2001. It's crazy that they want to forget about that money and just pull the dikes out now. There is a lot of precedent for getting some mitigation, but it will take someone to step up and be a lead on the effort.

Legue Island

Our efforts continue on this front. We have had no communication from WDFW regarding the groundwater study that was supposed to start months ago. We lost our original Hydraulic Project Approval (HPA) permit appeal over the past couple months, but the HPA permit expired so WA State Dept of Transportation (WSDOT) renewed it, and we appealed this renewal, so this administrative hearing round starts all over again. Difference now is that we have two new players who have joined the appeal, so we expect to receive SEPA (State Environmental Policy Act) standing this time around, which will very clearly show WSDOT and WDFW purposefully worked around our coalition's concerns.

Regardless, all of this **HPA** permit appeal effort is secondary to the injunction we will be filing in Superior Court. If you have been following this, you know that we have been working toward this filing for some time. Our lawyer changed firms, and we have to exhaust all other possible remedies (such as the **HPA permit appeal)** to be sure we have standing for the legal action. Look for our filing at the end of January. It is nearly unfathomable that a superior court judge would eliminate our standing on

SEPA and other issues given the fact that **WDFW** has known our coalitions concerns for 7 years and has yet to address them in any plans provided to us for **Leque Island**.

If you find public hunting access areas such as **Leque Island** or the **Willapa National Wildlife Refuge** to be of value, you can contribute to our Legal Fund to help pay for these and other efforts such fighting the proposed Thurston County No Shoot Zone. We can't do what seems necessary, without you. Become a member, recruit a new member, learn more, and get involved.

Pick Up Your Spent Shells

NW Chapter member **Art Kendall** is overseeing the building of some spent shell collection receptacles. These are being built by a local high school metal shop and will look like a shotgun shell, right down to the words **Remington-Peters** on the top where the shells can be dumped in. We didn't get these done in time for this year, but will get them out next fall in an effort to get hunters to pick up their hulls.

Why do this? Well, the first thing we hear from anti-hunters when we go to meeting is..."you hunters are such slobs...leaving your empty shells and garbage all over." People have shown up at these meetings with bags of shotgun casings they find on the beach, telling us how we just don't care about the environment. So, these receptacles are an important reminder to hunters to PICK UP YOUR SPENT SHELLS. And watch for our annual litter pick up on the Snow Goose Quality Hunt fields in February or March.

Wood Duck Nest Box Time is Coming

As you prepare to check wood duck boxes, first get your official **WWA** wood duck nest box monitoring form, and once it is filled out, send it back to **Rone!** We'll try to get the form up on our website before the end of February. In the mean time, if you want a form, call **Rone.**

October Chapter Meeting Report

Shari Hildreth, Deputy District Director for U.S. Congresswoman Jaime Herrera-Beutler spoke at our October meeting regarding the breaching of the freshwater dikes at the Willapa National Wildlife Refuge in the final Comprehensive Conservation Plan (CCP). She indicated that contacting our Senators to encourage them to approve language that would not provide funding for the breaching in the 2012 Appropriations Bill. We also committed to providing a letter to the Secretary of the Interior explaining our disappointment in the CCP process in regards to consumptive users and the dike breaching (which we did).

In December Shari informed us that Congress has directed the USFWS to not breach the dikes until at least April of this year. With this new development coupled with the reassignment of Willapa NWR Manager Charlie Stenvall, we will now focus our efforts on USFWS Pacific Regional Director Robyn Thorson. A letter signed by WWA, Delta Waterfowl, Thurston County Farm Bureau, Washington Farm Bureau, Discovery Coast Audubon, and the Long beach Cranberry Growers Association has been sent challenging the CCP's decision to breach the dikes.

We're trying to put together some dates for Mallard nest tube replacement and Wood Duck nest box cleaning. As soon as we come up with a plan we'll be getting the info out to everyone.

I'm working with WDFW folks to put together an Aquatic Lands Enhancement Account (ALEA) grant request to do some habitat work in the Gloyd Seeps Unit of the North Columbia Basin Wildlife Area. The request is for funding to create about 5 acres of nesting cover with some shrub rows for winter cover. This project will be next to the North Crab Creek water delivery project for the increased irrigation project in the Basin.

Effective in the spring of 2013 water will run in this area all year long and provide many shallow ponds and lakes. After the test run in 2009 the area had many small ponds and held a lot of Waterfowl through the spring of 2010 when the area went dry and the ducks went away. We have identified an area of approximately 5 acres that shows potential for this plan. Nesting cover would be planted in November 2012, and the shrubs would go in in the spring of 2013.

Hopefully the project will score well and we will receive funding. **ALEA** grants are a reimbursement program so we have to pay up front and then get paid by **WDFW** after the bills are received. Deadline for submission is 2-29-12.





Congress Approves Federal Protection for Willapa National Wildlife Refuge

U.S. Fish and Wildlife directed to not breach dikes

Washington, DC – Today **Jaime Herrera Beutler** commended the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate for recently approving temporary federal protection for the **Willapa National Wildlife Refuge** in Pacific County, Washington. **Jaime** fought for this specific protection that directs the **U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS)** to refrain from flooding the refuge until at least April of 2012.

This protection for Willapa was part of the 2012 federal appropriation bill that was passed by overwhelming bipartisan majorities in Congress last week. Specifically, the bill's conference report contains language directing the USFWS to refrain from removing the levee systems on the **Lewis Point, Porter Point and Riekkola Units,** allowing it more time to address strong community concerns over this management alternative that would flood the refuge. The measure was approved by the House on Friday, December 16 (passed 296-121) and Senate on Saturday, December 17 (passed 67-32).

"This is good news for the folks of Southwest Washington who care about the future of this refuge," said **Jaime.** "It's clear that the proposal to permanently alter this valued community treasure does not have the public fully behind it. I will continue to do whatever it takes so that this permanent change doesn't move forward without the support of this community.

"I've been glad to take this issue to Congress for the folks of Pacific County, but we secured this protection because of the collaborative work of many. Senator Hatfield, Representative Blake and Representative Takko, Pacific County Commissioners Jon Kaino, Norman Cuffel, and Lisa Ayers, recreationalists, hunters, cranberry growers, and local citizens deserve credit for making their voices heard.

"I'll continue working hard so that residents of Southwest Washington are the ones who shape the future of this refuge they care so deeply about."

<u>Background:</u> In early 2011, Jaime became aware that the **USFWS** was pursuing controversial management alternatives that would flood and permanently alter the **Willapa National Wildlife Refuge** – and the Pacific County Community largely knew nothing about it.

Jaime worked with **USFWS** to extend the public comment period, and in March personally hosted a listening session in Ilwaco for hundreds of Pacific County residents to ask questions and express concerns. Despite the lack of local support, however, **USFWS** officials were readying plans to breach the dikes in preparation for their preferred management alternative.

In May of 2011 she helped lead a bipartisan coalition of elected officials and citizens to successfully convince the **Salmon Recovery Funding Board (SRFB)** to cancel funding for the dike breach. The Army Corps of Engineers subsequently cancelled the permits to demolish the dikes. Yet efforts to move forward with this change to the refuge are not dead, and **Jaime** continues to hear from concerned citizens who want to preserve the refuge as it has been for nearly 75 years.

HSUS Casts Dark Cloud Over American Agriculture in 2011

The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS), through its quest to become a mainstream organization, has again resorted to "backdoor" tactics by partnering with—or possibly forcing its agenda on—the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). Those HSUS efforts to infiltrate USDA regulations were recently exposed on the floor of U.S. Capital with testimony by Senator Jerry Moran (R-Kansas). Moran noted in his Nov. 2, 2011 comments that he discovered U.S. Department of Agriculture memos authorizing the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) to hold a forum—at taxpayer expense—on animal rights and agriculture. In fact, another memorandum noted that a prior meeting with HSUS and USDA staffers was held to "set the agenda" for the upcoming forum. Moran noted in his Senate testimony that USDA met with HSUS despite it being an animal rights organization and "no friend to rural America, farmers or ranchers." "HSUS spends their dollars lobbying against rural America and farmers and ranchers," stated Sen. Moran. "Tax documents show that HSUS spends less than one percent of its budget on animal shelters."

In a March 2011 HSUS news release, the group applauded the U.S. Department of Agriculture for launching a new database to increase public access to information regarding research facilities and other entities regulated under the Animal Welfare Act. The new_database came about, however, as a result of a lawsuit settlement agreement between USDA and the HSUS about access to animal research records under the Freedom of Information Act. The HSUS had sued the USDA, and many taxpayer dollars were spent defending against the HSUS suit that was filed in 2005. Details are at http://www.humanesociety.org/news/press_releases/2011/03/usda_animal_care_records_database_032911.html. Was this an HSUS effort to gain more control over the U.S. Department of Agriculture? Many other HSUS actions showcase their efforts to attack and infiltrate the agriculture industry. Another September 2011 HSUS news release reveals that other groups are joining the HSUS in their costly and bitter ballet initiatives directed at farms, ranches and agriculture.

"In Ohio, in 2010, The HSUS—and many of our traditional allies such as Farm Sanctuary, Mercy For Animals, the Toledo Area Humane Society, the Ohio Environmental Stewardship Alliance, and others—waged a campaign to place a <u>measure</u> on the statewide ballot to phase out a variety of the most inhumane factory farming practices," reports HSUS's Wayne Pacelle in a blog about Ohio and farming.

The HSUS has also focused their agriculture "sights" on Nebraska.

A Sept. 14, 2011 blog by HSUS's Wayne Pacelle decried Nebraska Governor Dave Heineman as "ill-informed and patently dishonest." This was because the Governor held a series of meetings with ranchers and farm groups across the state to tell them that HSUS was attempting to force its way into the state and is definitely no friend to farming or the agriculture industry. HSUS also boasted it had "...hammered out agreements in California, Colorado, Maine, Michigan, and Ohio on farm animal welfare...." Of course those agreements were often the results of lawsuits or threats of costly ballot initiatives by HSUS.

In May 2011, another HSUS release noted the group's pleasure when Florida's "lawmakers chose not to enact agribusiness' proposal to criminalize taking photographs or videos of farm animals." Seems HSUS videos being taken by "planted" HSUS employees at farms have appeared on television shows as documentaries or in national news programs as actual news. Yet, according to HSUS in an April 14, 2011 release, "undercover investigations of the meat industry have a long and important history in the United States." "All sportsmen and American's should be concerned that the nation's largest animal rights group has become advisors and partners to the agriculture industry," warns Bud Pidgeon, U.S. Sportsmen Alliance president and CEO. "This group's recent pushes to pass animal rights legislation that affects farms nationwide should be a warning of what to expect in the future—and that these recent actions by HSUS are very suspect."
