

### Habitat, Hunting, Legislation, Legal

### Hey Y'all,

On the fun side, I hope you get a chance to play in the mud & water this weekend and get yourself some ducks. I may end up sleeping out on the bay before opener to beat the tides. Spent many a day and night out there over the past 30 years; even did a little research on Spartina before it was eradicated with the herbicide Glyphosate and Imazapyr.

Did you know Spartina....

- changed the Bayfront significantly;
- created channels where there were none;
- raised the elevation of the bay quickly; and
- completely changed the invertebrate populations.

Kind of like cattails filling in that pothole you used to be able to put some decoys on. But Spartina may have been good for endangered fish species...lots of habitat to hide in there and lots of little critters for fish to eat. But we will never know because there were no investigations, and the state decided to plow it under using amphibious vehicles...or to kill it with herbicides Glyphosate or Imazapyr. There is still lots of rotting Spartina root clumps out there with the silt eroded from around them.

 Wonder what those herbicides did to change the bay and changed how ducks use it?

### WDFW Closes Access to Portions of Skagit Wildlife Area HQ Unit

OLYMPIA – Public access will be disrupted weekdays through mid-December at the Skagit Wildlife Area Headquarters Unit on Fir Island.


Contractors for **WDFW** began work Monday, Oct. 12, to repair the tide gate and culvert structure along **Wiley Slough.** The trail along the dike and the small boat launch for the marsh area will be closed **weekdays** through Dec. 18. **Those areas will be open Saturdays and Sundays.** 

**Wildlife Area Manager, Belinda Rotton**, noted that the boat launch to **Freshwater Slough** will remain open daily through construction.

Construction crews will dismantle and rebuild the tide gate and culvert structure in an effort to address concerns about effective tide gate drainage and failing culverts. The **HQ Unit** is a popular spot for waterfowl hunting, fishing, bird-watching and walking. The 190-acre headquarters estuary is part of **WDFW's** 16,700-acre **Skagit Wildlife Area**, located on the south end of **Fir Island**.



For all of you white goose hunters it has started snowing here in the valley with about 5K more landing every day.

### ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) Blind Activities

On Sept. 11<sup>th</sup> **Col. Tom O'Dell, Marv Leyda** and **myself** brushed up the two (2) **ADA**-capable blinds on the **Frenchman Restricted Access Area**, and on Sept. 12<sup>th</sup>, **Bill** and **Rosann Green** and **myself** finished up the job plus measured out the dimensions to build ramps to make sure a wheelchair can access the blinds.

On Sept. 26<sup>th</sup> Bill and Rosann Green, Col. ### Youth Only Hunt Weekend at Ilwaco a First Step

The First Ever Youth Only Hunt at the Porter Point Unit of the Willapa National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) was a learning experience for all involved. The good news is that the number of adults volunteers showing up to help put this on for SW WA Area Youth out-numbered the youth participants by about 4 to 1. The bad news is that there were only three (3) youth participants!

Thanks to WWA member volunteers, Dan Heasley (LC), Mike Lovelace (SEA), Ben Welton (NW); and Jack Westerfield (SW) for joining me and representing WWA at this inaugural event. A big THANKS also to Ben and NW WA Regional DU Director [and WWA-Seattle Chapter member,] John Tierney, for gathering up literally boxes full of DU "freebies" to complement the freebies provided by the WWA -Seattle Chapter for the Youth. Too bad we couldn't have given away more than just the three (3) camo knapsacks filled with the goodies.

There were multiple reasons for the light turnout. (1) We knew going in that the tides for the Youth Only Hunt Saturday, September 19th, were not conductive to a hunt out on the saltmarsh. (2) Consequently it was a long slog of about 1/2 to 3/4 miles out to the bay front for the supervised youth. (3) Only one group of ducks was spotted on the horizon all morning; and (4) the problem with Youth in **SW WA** is not getting them out from behind their cell phones and other hand held electronic devices. This time of year a good number of these area youth are out in the hills with bows and muzzleloaders with family trying to put some venison and/or elk in their freezers at home.

Next year the **Willapa NWR** plans to do like the **Ridgefield NWR** — not tie the event to the third weekend in September and again be at the mercy of the tide gods. Instead they will close down to Youth Hunting Only the **Willapa Complex** on a Saturday morning in October with the highest predicted tides of that month and utilizing the many blinds available at the **Riekkola** Goose Field. 
### BJ Brown Memorial Shoot Donates Another \$1K+ to WWA

### WWA Invited to Join "Hunting Works for Washington" By Jim Goldsmith

**Hunting Works for Washington** is a great step toward reaching out to the many people in Washington that don't hunt, and to those that do hunt to provide them with information about "...the role hunting and shooting sports play in both the heritage and economic health of Washington." We have been in discussions about how to ensure public opinion isn't negatively swayed by the emotionally-based diatribe and propaganda that is continuously used by anti-hunters and environmental extremists.

We had been looking at the Colorado Model which is nicely presented by the **Nimrod Society** in a video. However, we also realized pursuing the Colorado Model approach would take a lot of time, effort, and legislative and **WDFW** cooperation. **Hunting Works for Washington** fell into our laps shortly after those discussions began about the Colorado Model and other methods of outreach and education.

We are fortunate to have **Mark Pidgeon** signed-on as a co-chair with **Hunting Works for Washington**. This gives an even greater benefit to the hunting community and all of the members of **Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC)** and the **Hunters Heritage Council (HHC)**, of which **WWA** is a voting member. Although I am just a individual member of **WWA**, I would like to see **WWA** to become a partner in this educational outreach to the non-hunting public. Many Washington hunting organizations and businesses have already added their names and links onto the growing list.

If you have any specific questions regarding Hunting Works for Washington, I believe **Mark** will be able to get an answer for you.

Hello —

I am emailing you about a new organization called **Hunting Works for Washington (HWFW).** The purpose of **Hunting Works for Washington** is to educate the general public on the economic impact that hunting has on our economy and the amount that hunters pay for conservation. The effort is being funded by the **Na-tional Shooting Sports Foundation (NSSF)**, the trade industry association for the firearms industry.

The number one contributor to the animal-rights effort is the anti-gun movement. No hunting means one less need for guns. Shotgun sales would drop to about zero as would bolt action rifles. The **NSSF**, which has incredible amounts of money, realized that they need to support hunters and hunting to protect their industry. I am proud to say that I have been named one of the state co-chairs of **Hunting Works for Washington**.

I was wondering it the **Washington Waterfowler Association** would want to become a partner of **HWFW**? It costs nothing. It is non-political, non-partisan, educational effort, so it wouldn't jeopardize your 501(c)(3) tax exempt status. To me this is a no-brainer. How can you beat free?

They have hired a national PR company and a PR company in the state to promote this and NSSF is paying the freight. PR Newswire is on board, and many specie specific organizations are on board with HWFW including Delta Waterfowl, The Ruffed Grouse Society, National Wild Turkey Federation, Mule Deer Foundation, and Pheasants Forever. I would love to have WWA as part of this effort. WWC and HHC are also partners.

Hunting Works For America launched in 2010 in three states: Arizona, Minnesota and North Dakota. Washington is the second state to launch this year. A new chapter in Maine was started at the end of July. All totaled, the Hunting Works For America program now represents more than 1,500 businesses, organizations and associations representing tens of thousands of stakeholders.


