

Thank You for Voting:

I want to thank those of you who took part in the voting on the recent changes to the by-laws. The results are forthcoming. If you haven't voted yet, you can still do so by the end of this month. See Pages 5 and 6 for a detailed explanation the proposed changes to the By-Laws and a ballot with instructions on Page 7. It is important to keep the guidelines by which **WWA** operates fluid while respecting our heritage.

2017 Duck Stamp:

Well for those of you who lay awake at night wondering what the **2017 duck stamp** will look like, your insomnia will soon be ceasing. This year's **Washington Waterfowl Artist, Dee Dee Murry,** has done an exceptional job of capturing a young Yellow Labrador putting up some Cinnamon Teal while at play.

The first batch of prints have arrived from the printer for signing and the digital image is in Arkansas on its way to becoming collector stamps. The prints will probably be ready around the middle of August.

As in previous years, **Life Members and Previous Collectors** will be afforded the opportunity to reserve a specific numbered print through July 31st. Thereafter, print sales will be opened to the general membership and the public.

WWA continues to tightly limit the number of prints we produce to just 110 units; of which, #'s 101 thru 110 go to WDFW, #'s 90 thru 100 go to the artist, and the remainder go up for sale. Further, to make our artwork more collectible, WWA offers the corresponding stamp for collectors.

Most folks are probably unaware that the creation of the duck stamp takes the better part of the year. Subject selection, multiple artist communications, artist submissions, winner determination, deadlines, supplier communications, pricing decisions, weekly disbursal of complimentary stamps and sales to philatelic retailers are just part of the annual routine. Oh, and the communications with WDFW to create the appropriate pages in the waterfowl hunting regulations.

Does **WWA** make money on this project? Is the Duck Stamp worthwhile? The **WWA** was responsible for the

creation of the State stamp in 1986. Washington is just one of thirty remaining states that produce a duck stamp. Although the Washington duck stamp/migratory bird permit are among the most expensive in the land; our stamps are highly collectible. As a whole, **WWA** runs in the black on the program; we haven't always done so. We are much better in managing the process than we were in 2012 when we produced our first stamps and prints.

The Washington State Duck Stamp would have ended had it not been for the efforts of Washington Waterfowl Association and the late Doug Graef.

The Duck Stamp committee welcomes two new members to our ranks, **Mike Bell and Scott Keith**. Their backgrounds in stamp collecting and graphics will ensure and enhance the future of the State duck stamp program. Mike will be taking over the chairmanship of the duck stamp committee in the near future. **Welcome aboard and Thank You both for stepping up.**

Due to the great suppliers we work with, we intend to hold the matted & framed print & stamp delivered to your door at \$120 again this year.

By-Laws and Proposed Changes:

At the All-Chapter Meeting held on April 6, the following By-Laws were proposed to be changed. Please make sure to cast your vote by June 30 at your local chapter meeting or via email. Summary of Proposed Changes to WWA By-Laws:

Amend #5 — Chapter chair or his appointee afforded one seat on BOD, should chapter not elect to execute, BOD will appoint to the seat

Amend #6 — Provides for attendance through electronic means as well as voting via proxy

Amend #7 — Clarifies the qualifications for eligibility to hold office as a chapter officer, BOD member, or corporate officer

<u>Amend #8</u> — Allows a 60% (super majority) vote by existing Directors to amend the By-Laws

<u>Amend #9</u> — Provides language for the disbursal of assets in the event of the dissolution of either a chapter or corporate organizations

Shillapoo Update: WDFW's Estimates Show Waterfowl Will Suffer from Shillapoo Dike Breechings:

According to the WDFW's own estimates, in an "average water year" the "South Unit Buckmire Slough Salmon Restoration Project," better know to us as the BPA/WDFW Shillapoo dike breeching proposal, will negatively impact at least 80 non-salmonoid species including two (2) which are threatened or endangered and reduce goose and duck use of South Shillapoo by 65% and 62% respectively. If it happens, this project will decrease wildlife use and habitat, decrease recreational use including hunting, bird watching, and dog training, and decrease native plant species while increasing invasive plants and fish. WDFW also estimates that this so-called "Restoration Project" will result in a dryer South Shillapoo Unit during all seasons. What a deal for wildlife!

These estimates were presented as PowerPoint slides during the May 19th briefing to the **Shillapoo Wildlife Area Advisory Committee** at the **Region 5 office** in Vancouver, WA. They are extremely significant because, while we've all felt in our gut that this project would be detrimental to waterfowl, we've had no reliable estimates from competent authority to interest other parties in joining our fight. **Now we do!** These estimates stem from **WDFW's own biologists**; the folks who know and manage this area.

Citing these **WDFW** estimates, I urge everyone to contact their Congressional and Legislative Representatives and ask them to oppose this project.

We should also demand that, should the Shillapoo dike breechings happen, mitigation be established for damage to non-salmonoid species. We should provide these estimates to other organizations such as Delta Waterfowl, the Audubon Society, the NRA, local news media, etc. asking them to join our fight. WDFW has given us the ammo we need to do this; we should use it!

Detailed Information on Proposed Amendments

The following is a more thorough explanation of the proposed By-Law changes provided courtesy of Board Member Bob Taylor. Please cast your vote on page 8 and return your ballot to Kurt Snyder by June 30. Instructions included on ballot.

Amendment #5(February 3, 2017)

Article III, Section I is amended so that one director may come from each chapter with the provision that the chapter chair or his appointee may function as that chapter's board member should that chapter fail to elect anyone. If fewer than nine total board members result, additional board members may be elected at large.

Why This Proposed Amendment?: Although this section already says, "The Board of Directors shall generally consist of a representative from each chapter.", many chapters to date have not elected a board member with the result that these chapters are not represented at the state level. This amendment is an attempt to provide representation for all chapters while ensuring that there will be nine board members.

Amendment #6(February 3, 2017)

Article III, Section I is additionally amended to allow a board member to give another board member his proxy. The board will create proper forms for such proxies.

Why This Proposed Amendment?: No matter where board meetings will be held, some members will be faced with long drives in order to attend. This has become an issue in recruiting willing board members from all chapters. Although Article III, Section I already states, "Electronic attendance by Officers and/or Board member is permissible." this has proven difficult to implement due to bandwidth and computer compatibility issues. Allowing proxies will make it easier for all board members to perform their duties.

Amendment #7(February 3, 2017)

Article III, Section 13 is amended to permit by-laws to be amended by a super-majority (60%) vote of all currently seated board members.

Why This Proposed Amendment?: Getting a vote on by-law amendments from all chapters state-wide has become nearly impossible since some chapters meet irregularly and one holds no meetings at all. With a determined effort to seek board representation from all chapters this

amendment will allow the Washington Waterfowl Association to better adapt to new circumstances while still ensuring input from everyone.

Amendment #8(February 3, 2017)

Article III, Section 14 is amended as follows: 1. If a local chapter folds, any remaining assets it holds will become the possession of the Corporate Organization. 2. If the Corporate Organization folds its remaining assets will be divided between existing chapters proportionately based on membership. Local chapters wishing to continue, may keep their own assets; but if they later fold, their assets must be donated to a non-profit.

Why This Proposed Amendment?: In the event the state organization can not continue functioning it is entirely possible that some local chapters may wish to continue their conservation and hunter advocacy efforts independently. Since local chapters generally conduct their own funding efforts, it would be unfair to require them to surrender their own funds and fold simply because the state organization had done so. This amendment would allow local chapters to continue. The proviso that their money must be donated to a non-profit if they fold is necessary to ensure the tax-deductible status of monies donated to Washington Waterfowl.

Amendment #9(April 6, 2017)

In the event that the Corporate Organization folds, individual Chapters would, as they desire, assume the responsibility for the setting, collection and usage of annual dues.

Why This Proposed Amendment?: This is simply reality. If the state organization folds local chapters continuing operations must assume these tasks themselves.



Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife Update

Frenchman Regulated Access Area and Enhancement Project

By: Chattan McPherson (WDFW Wetland Biologist)

Columbia Basin Wildlife Area staff have been involved in moist soil management in all wetland cells of the Frenchman Regulated Access Area. During April and May of 2017 wetland cells were harrowed, which breaks up top layers of soils and vegetation. This process allows for desired wetland plant species to establish, or for WDFW to plant food plots for waterfowl and other wetland associated wildlife species. Through our efforts some wetlands were harrowed and left to let desirable wetland plant species self-propagate, while other portions of wetland cells were planted with Millet, Smartweed, and Sudan grass. These planted crops will provide fall, winter, and spring migrating waterfowl with valuable forage. Waterfowl hunters will also see a benefit from planted areas within wetland cells.

The Frenchman Enhancement project field work started late May of 2017. WDFW staff, Ducks Unlimited Regional Engineer, and contracting crew began contouring, excavation, and creating a new water delivery ditch. These efforts' main focus is to reset succession and create wetland habitat that is valuable to wildlife and recreational users.

The expansion unit of the **Frenchman Project** historically had a significant amount of Russian olives, and water delivery through the cell had established its own route back to the Frenchman wasteway. Now with a delivery ditch system, water control structures, and removal of Russian olives, the total available amount of wetland acres will be increased. Work in **Cell 5** has been focused on contouring of the wetland cell. These alterations will increase efficiency of vegetation management, moist soil management, and will make the cell more user friendly to waterfowl hunters. Other work concerning the enhancement project focuses on the

establishment of islands in some of the wetland cells. Islands will create loafing areas for waterfowl, making cells more attractive and alluring to waterfowl. Islands will also offer waterfowl hunters the opportunity to hunt from within the wetland cell surrounded by water, which in certain conditions could improve opportunity.




