I swear each year they come in by the pound starting in August, and it seems they continue right into November; oh, and then as I recall, the sale catalogues come in February and March.

Cabela's, Bass Pro Shops, Roger's Sporting Goods, and more fill my mailbox to start with. I'm not sure, but I think I get two from **Cabela's**...one in August, and then the 'just in case you forgot to order' version in October. (*I do miss getting my annual leatherette hard-bound editions of the Cabela's catalogues; they made me feel like I was being recognized as a true* **Cabela's** *addict.*)

And then there's the local retailer's advertising that starts rolling in come September: **Sportsman's Warehouse**, **Dick's Sports, Big 5**...and of course **Bass Pro and Cabela's** again, and more.

I can't remember when I last ordered something as I think I have now accumulated at least two of every waterfowl product ever invented. Oh, I'm mistaken; I do remember my last order for a new pair of chest waders. (**Cabela's** refused to take the old ones back based on my claim that they had shrunk.)

With the aforementioned statements in mind, it cracks me up that even though I have no intention of buying anymore gear.... I can't wait to sift through the pages looking at the same stuff I have been seeing for the last 40 or 50 years AND the latest, greatest revelations from the likes of *Fred Zink, Remington, Greenhead Gear, Dakota Waterfowl, RNT, Eliminator Blinds, Black Cloud, Tri-Tronics* and the like. I find myself debating annually with my son **Eric** about the

word: MARKETING. He can hear me in his sleep I'm sure. "Eric(!), they [the manufacturers] have to come up with the slightest variation every year and convince you that last year's innovation is no longer good enough...or they're out of business. Don't buy anymore gear!" It's had no impact on him. If I were to guess that my son's net worth was a \$million, \$975k would be tied up in calls, decoys, boats, trailers, shotguns, and the like. Nuf said about that.

When I started getting into hunting birds and waterfowl years ago, I went to **Sears** for my shotgun... \$89 (*can't find a shooter there anymore*). I went to JC Penney for my cotton camo and hunting boots... total less than \$50...ya' know they can't be found at those stores any longer. I think I bought my shot-shells and duck decoys from **PayLess Drugs**...maybe \$2.50 a box of LEAD waterfowl loads and around \$12 a dozen for dekes in shrink wrap...don't remember when I last saw a **PayLess...** they're long since gone.

So back to the waterfowl catalogues; I just chuckle when I see a *Zink* goose call going for \$159.99, a *DryFowl* waterfowling jacket for \$169.99, a **Cabela's** layout blind for \$339.99 cause I just know the gear I hunt with is approaching "collectible" status fast.

My heirs are going to make a killing. 🙂

WWA FERD NIST MEMORIAL TROPHY

There are 9 spaces left on the trophy. Bill Maxwell of the Seattle Chapter is the defending champion! This year's winner will be announced in September.

Ferd Nist contest Rules

- 1. Shoot in the months of July and August.
- 2. Declare before starting event that your score will count for the Ferd Nist Competition.
- 3. Have your score witnessed by another chapter member or range personal.
- 4. Report your score next day to David Hanson, 425-260-4816, or davidhan-

- 5. Tie breaker-high score from the slider.
- 6. Second tie breaker- Sudden Death, first miss loses. Shoots in August.

The Competition (Each event does not have to be completed in the same day) 100 Clays, compete for the bragging rights, "Who is the best shot." The highest score wins.

Event I

Trap, 16 yard, 25 clays, shoot 5 clays from each post. Report score

<u>Event II</u>

Trap, Slider, 25 clays, shoot 5 clays from each post, moving back or forward 2 yards after each shot.

(Example)

Start at post 1, 16 yd, shoot clay 1 Move back to 18 yd, shoot clay 2 Move back to 20 yd, shoot clay 3 Move back to 22 yd, shoot clay 4 Move back to 24 yd, shoot clay 5 Rotate to post 2, 24 yd, shoot clay 6 Move forward to 22 yd, shoot clay 7, Continue moving 2 yards for each shot forwards and backwards at each post. Ending on Post 5, 24yd. Report score.

<u>Event III</u>

Trap doubles, 50 clays, 16 yard, two clays at the same time, 5 doubles on each post. Report score.

Leque Island Update:

A series of public meetings hosted by WDFW were convened to disseminate information on the project from 2013 - 2015. Rick Skiba and other members are still involved in the project as it enters the construction phase. Rick recently held an on-line interview with the WDFW Project Manager. A big thank you to Rick Skiba and other WWA members for their continued involvement in this project supporting the interests of our waterfowl heritage and their communities.

Leque Island Project Update:

By: Rick Skiba

Below is an on-line interview **Rick Skiba** conducted with Loren Brokaw (Restoration Projects Coordinator, Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, WDFW) on the current status of Leque Island.

Q: Loren, what is the current status of the funding, permitting process and schedule/timeline for the 1st Phase (interior ditching and channels) and the 2nd Phase (exterior dike removal) of Leque Island?

A: The first phase of the project is scheduled for construction beginning in mid-July. **WDFW** has grant funds under contract to build this scope of work, which involves preparing the site for future dike removal. The main elements are digging channels, filling ditches, removing a berm, and building some higher elevation mounds to dissipate wave energy, support potential nesting habitat, and provide higher ground for duck blinds. Construction is supposed to take between 8-12 weeks, so we plan on demobilizing off of the site in time for the waterfowl hunting opener.

The second phase of the project is still a bit uncertain regarding timeline because we don't yet have a full funding package in place for construction. We are currently wrapping up a phase of modeling work that will inform the design, and then we'll draft the next set of design drawings. Permitting won't start until the next set of drawings are done and reviewed. If grants that we've applied for over the past year are successful, it is possible that construction could happen in 2018.

Q: Update on the public access recommendations provided by the Recreation Access Committee.

A: We've been working to incorporate as many of the recommendations of the Committee as possible. Here's a list of the recommendations, and a short update on each.

- 1. Motorized boat launch with large parking lot: In progress, see below details.
- 2. Hand boat launch on **Davis Slough**: See below.
- Small islands for nesting and duck blinds: We incorporated these in the design for Phase 1. They are referenced as "marsh mounds" in the permitting and design documents.

- Leave portions (20' or so) of existing dike: This is still a possibility, and will be explored further and decided in the Phase 2 design and permitting effort.
- Create low areas that hold water at minus tides: We are not planning to incorporate this one because it is very difficult to have permitted, because of fish stranding/water quality concerns.

Q: Will pheasant be released on the island this coming hunting season? If not, where will the birds be released?

A: No pheasants will be released this year. We are actively exploring options for releasing birds in other locations, though I don't think anything has been decided yet.

Q: What is the status of replacement lands in Skagit and Snohomish County? Any word on the property north of Highway 532, northwest of Stanwood?

A: We are pursuing every avenue we can to get funding to acquire replacement lands, but are open to more ideas if you have any. We have one willing seller that we know of, and probably more if we had funding, but lack of funding is holding us up. We built a \$2 million line item in a grant budget for the **Leque** project for replacement lands, but the funding agency (RCO) determined that it is not an eligible cost for the grants they administer and subsequently removed it from the budget. I gave a presentation to the Snohomish County Sustainable Lands Strategy Group (it's a coalition of Tribes, agencies, non-profits, and farmers) last month to try to gather more community support for replacement lands, in hopes that enough support can raise the priority level for funders. A letter of support is in the works from that group. If WWA has an interest in writing a support letter, let me know and I can work on a template for you to consider. The property you mention is still for sale, and we are awaiting the legislative capital budget to see if our Floodplains by Design Proposal will be funded, which includes funds for acquiring that property.

Q: Is the motorized boat ramp at the Hamilton Smokestack site still a go? Did the city of Stanwood and DFW agree to the motorized ramp? Funding available? Permits in work? Timeline?



A: Yes! The City agreed to a motorized ramp, and I submitted a grant application that was scored favorably. There's a 99% chance we'll get the funds, pending the legislative capital budget. Funds should be available around the August timeframe, and we'll be on a design/permit track for construction in either the summer of 2018 or 2019.

Q: Davis Slough hand boat launch adjacent to the existing Highway 532 parking lot...What do we need to do to get this accomplished?

A: Can we plan on having you come out to the site this summer during construction to talk with me and the engineer about your vision for the hand launch? We held off on excavating a tidal channel near the **Davis Slough** parking area in Phase 1, so that we don't take away options for a hand launch or trail coming off of the parking area in Phase 2. We'll likely need to reinforce the parking area in Phase 2, so that would be the natural time to build something in that area. We'd need to include it in the design and run it by permitting agencies and funders for it to be possible though, so meeting on site in July/August would be good so we can get the dialogue going.



Shillapoo Update Clarifications:

At the request of **WDFW Region 5** personnel and in an effort to be as scientifically accurate as possible, I've agreed to publish the following clarification to two)2) items in my Shillapoo Update article of last month; nothing else in that article is altered.

This project is still Bad for Birds per our Region 5 folks!

This is to clarify two items in my last month's article entitled: "Shillapoo Update: WDFW's Estimates Show Waterfowl Will Suffer from Shillapoo Dike Breechings". Note that the real name of this project is "South Unit Buckmire Slough Salmon Restoration Project".

(1) The first clarification concerns my statement that the dike breeching proposal "will negatively impact at least 80 non-salmonoid species." According to the **WDFW Region 5 folks**, it would be more correct to say that **WDFW** is concerned about the potential impact to 80 wildlife species.

(2) Secondly the Region 5 folks want me to emphasize that the potential reduction in goose and duck use of **South Shillapoo** is based on waterfowl use when water is currently present in surveyed wetlands on the area, compared to the probability of water being present if the project was constructed and assuming the daily waterfowl numbers were the same as current condition counts during the February to April survey periods.

The waterfowl use will fluctuate depending upon Columbia River water levels so the change might be less during an above average water year but may be greater during a year of below average Columbia River flows.



Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife Update

Ephrata Lake Waterfowl Project:

WDFW has begun taking steps to restore and improve an important waterfowl area within the Columbia Basin. **Ephrata Lake** has a historically high value for waterfowl productivity. Prior to 2006, there were consistently more than 40 broods (some counts as high as 120!) that could be regularly observed, however in recent years there are typically 5 broods. The suspected reason for the decline is the presence of fish. There have been multiple attempts to establish a recreational fishery, both lawful and unlawful, so as a result in 1986 and 1988 the lake was treated to remove the fish. Currently fish are still there, likely from an unlawful introduction rather than survivors of previous *rotenone* treatment. All fishing has been closed since 2004 to reduce the likelihood of any further illegal fish stocking.

During spring and summer 2016, aquatic

invertebrates were

surveyed at several

wetland sites throughout the Columbia Basin to assess the insect biomass available to waterfowl within each wetland. Comparisons of invertebrate biomass in fish-free versus fish-bearing waters suggested that fish-free waters have a greater abundance of aquatic invertebrates which is supported by other published research. **WDFW** found six (6) times more insect biomass in similar wetlands without fish than in wetlands with fish.

After evaluating issues associated with lake rehabilitation, **WDFW** concluded **Ephrata Lake** has much greater value and potential as a waterfowl production lake. The current objective for the site is to increase waterfowl production by increasing available food resources to waterfowl hens and broods, and to increase the quality of nesting habitat in the adjacent uplands. In the fall of 2017, the fish will be removed and an upland restoration plan will be developed to address the degraded condition of the available waterfowl nesting habitat.


