On March 10th a total of 25 nest tubes in seven (7) ponds in the **Winchester Wasteway** were brought into working condition by a group of **WWA-Moses Lake Chapter** members and **WDFW** Volunteers, who got lucky with the spring weather and enjoyed a clear, crisp, sunny, Saturday, in the outdoors.

WWA-ML Chapter members included John Arnold, Fritz Keimle, Mark Olmstead, Jeff Waltz, and Bruce Feagan. They were joined by volunteers Nick Anderson, Rick Nelson, and Ella Rowan.

Included in the refurbishing were the next tubes located at **Birder's Corner**. Located in the NW corner at the intersection of **Dodson Road** and **Frenchman Hills Road**, **Birder's Corner** is a highly visible location for wildlife viewing and a frequently used location for many species of waterfowl. Check it out next time you're in the **Potholes** area. Earlier in March a number of **WWA-ML Chapter** members participated in a litter cleanup at the **Blyth Boat Ramp** on **Potholes Reservoir.** The boat ramp is used by fishers, hunters, and other recreational users of the lake year round. #### Skagit Wildlife Area - Clean Up:

Mission accomplished at the **Farmed Island Unit and Samish Unit**. Thanks to Chapter members, **WDFW** personnel and plenty of sunshine. We spent Saturday March 3<sup>rd</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> dragging trash bags around and filling them with spent shot shells and plenty of other trash. Ok we also ate donuts and drank coffee before and after.

Members split up into teams to cover these large areas. These are both some of the heaviest used waterfowl hunting areas in the region. We also evaluated the blinds at these sites for maintenance needs prior to the next season. One of our Chapter's goals is for individuals to take personal interest in a **"Blind Through Adoption** 

**Program."** This includes any necessary blind maintenance with materials provided by **WDFW.** There's 34 blinds in these two areas, and we have made a good start.

#### Wood Duck Nest Box Maintenance:

Sometimes being a Wood Duck means getting a new home or at least a clean one. At February's chapter meeting some of our members built several new boxes for deployment in the region.

Throughout the month members have made the duck homes a cleaner place to nest. Numerous Wood Duck Boxes in both **Snohomish and Skagit counties** received the royal treatment. Members also refurbished some of the local Mallard Nesting Tubes.

#### April Meeting:

## 2016 National Survey of Fishing, Hunting and Wildlife- Associated Recreation: National Overview

From the earliest days of our nation, the love of nature and a connection with the outdoors, have always been an integral part of our identity as Americans. Which is why it's not surprising that even as our society continues to change and diversify in the 21st Century, those values endure.

Our passion for wildlife and wild places, and the lengths to which we go to pursue that passion, are reflected in the preliminary findings of the **2016 National Survey of Fishing, Hunting and Wildlife-Associated Recreation.** 

As it has since it was first conducted in 1955 – and every five (5) years since – this detailed and rigorous survey is based on interviews with thousands of Americans from all walks of life.

The preliminary 2016 findings should hearten everyone who cares about the health of our wildlife, natural landscapes and people. In 2016, more than 101 million Americans – a staggering 40 percent of the U.S. population – participated in some form of fishing, hunting or other wildlife-associated recreation such as birdwatching or outdoor photography. And in doing so, we spent an estimated \$156.3 billion on equipment, travel, licenses and fees. These expenditures represent 1 percent of the nation's Gross Domestic Product – creating and supporting thousands of jobs and communities across the nation.

More than 35.8 million Americans went fishing in 2016, while 11.5 million hunted and 86 million watched wildlife. This means that 14 percent of Americans 16 years of age or older fished, 5 percent hunted and 35 percent participated in wildlife watching.

These findings are not just good news for the nation's economy. Revenues from the sale of licenses and tags, as well as excise taxes paid by hunters, anglers and shooters continue to support vital wildlife and habitat conservation efforts in every state and U.S. territory. And on a personal level, a growing body of scientific research suggests that we're all healthier, happier and better off in myriad ways when we spend time in nature. We will continue to analyze and refine the data gathered in 2016, releasing final numbers and a series of detailed special reports to help the conservation community use this information to connect even more Americans with their natural heritage.



# WDFW Letter to the Flock

## 2017-18 Waterfowl Surveys in The North Puget Sound

## **By: Paul DeBruyn WDFW**

Our normal waterfowl aerial survey routine was a bit truncated by funding issues this year but we did manage two flights each for dabblers, snow geese and brant geese.

#### **Dabbling Ducks**

We flew a normal pre hunting season flight on 9 October and found a pretty normal distribution of ducks in the bays. Wigeon had yet to arrive in big numbers on **Padilla Bay** and northern mallards were still a little low in their normal **Skagit Bay** haunts.

The mid-winter flight was conducted on 2 January and was indicative of a normal "good" year for waterfowl. Numbers of Pintails in **Samish Bay** and Wigeon in **Padilla** *and* **Skagit Bays** were probably under represented as many birds were feeding in dry fields. Not shown on the chart were impressive numbers of scaup in **Lummi Bay** and Canvasbacks in **Drayton Harbor**.

# WDFW Letter to the Flock

## Snow Geese

Our snow geese flights are a joint effort with the **Canadian Wildlife Service** as the population spans the border with birds regularly moving back and forth between the **Fraser Delta in B.C.** and the north **Puget Sound** estuaries. We flew on December 21<sup>st</sup> and the Canadians flew on January 20<sup>th</sup>. The two surveys came amazingly close with both sets of photos revealing about 85,000 birds. A flock in **Whatcom County** managed to give us the slip on both flights but was counted from the ground and numbered about 2,000 individuals. These numbers were down a little from last year but are still robust enough to justify increased bag limits.



## **Brant Geese**

Two Brant flights showed similar low numbers of these marine geese. The second flight was done after a period of northeast winds that no doubt drove some birds south. Given that there were low percentages of juvenile birds in hunter's bags and observed on the water says a poor breeding year was at least partially responsible for low total numbers. An experimental photo count done on **Padilla and Samish Bays** extrapolated slightly higher numbers but still not enough to justify a full hunting season in **Skagit County**.




