

Letter from the President Continued from Page 1

As waterfowlers and gun owners you owe to yourself and your families the knowledge of knowing who sponsored the bills above in this just past legislative session.

There is little doubt in *MY* mind that the aforementioned legislators seek the ban of all firearms in Washington State.

One of the best and most memorable people I ever worked for was a white haired Irishman named **Jack Casey.** He had what seemed like countless anecdotes for just about every situation. One of those applies to those listed above. He would tell me occasionally, "Jimmy, you need to remember the 11th Commandment 'Know Thy Enemy'".

For the purpose of this application and in the interest of Political Correctness, I'll amend that to read, "Know Thy Friends."

Commencing with this newsletter, you will be seeing ongoing ads to join **NRA** each month. If you are not a member, please consider joining. As Americans, outdoors enthusiasts, and people who believe we need to maintain the right to protect ourselves, our property, and those we love. We do not want **Our Country** to go the route of Canada or Australia. Click here to join **NRA** today.

I make donations to causes and people I believe in. Sometimes I even do a little work on behalf of my candidates and causes. That said, part of the joy for doing my good deeds is an ongoing onslaught of requests for help... financial and other.

As president of **WWA**, I don't believe I have ever sought donations for a particular cause. In this, my last newsletter article, I'm going to depart from that record.

Over the past couple of years, as you are well aware, **WWA** has been embroiled in a dispute with **WDFW** over the destruction of **Shillapoo Wildlife Area** in southwest Washington. The Directors and Officers have made the decision in recent months to expound too much on neither our efforts nor our successes.

You need to know that your directors and officers have burned the candles at both ends filing **Public Disclosure Requests (PDR's),** sifting and researching documents, driving up and down the highways, meeting with Legislators during the week and on weekends to educate them as to our viewpoint on the **Shillapoo** Dispute. **WWA** members and officers have attended at least four (4) public and private meetings with **WDFW**.

As a result, the Washington State Legislature "pulled the funding" for the project from the coming budget period.

Your leadership is now moving into a new phase of the **defense of Shillapoo** and the other dozen or so wildlife areas created and maintained for specific purposes around Washington. It is important for all of you to understand the basics of the Pittman-Robertson Act.
That being that all hunting and fishing equipment in the U.S. has an additional tax tacked on that goes to the Department of the Interior to be spent on the creation and maintenance of areas such as **Shillapoo.**

Shillapoo was , in part, created and maintained for the <u>express benefit and purpose of waterfowl.</u>

Washington State and **WDFW** entered into contracts and obligations with the **Department of the Interior** — **the U.S. Government** — to create **Shillapoo**. **Shillapoo** is in fact a public trust managed by **WDFW**.

They do not have the right to back out of the deal with we sportsmen and women who have been paying into the trust for over 70 years. They do not have the right to sacrifice the 80 plus species who use the area in the "hope" that they will be able to re-create a Salmon fishery from over 100 years ago.

Lastly, *it has been an honor* to have attempted to set direction for **WWA** over the past few years. I wish I could have done more. That said, I want to acknowledge all of you members that make a difference on behalf of waterfowl and waterfowling. I especially want to acknowledge the **directors and officers** for their many efforts...and for putting up with me. And, I want to say thank you so much Matty Moore for helping get our newsletter out each month... I still owe you a lunch.







Two of the nest boxes with ducklings hatched on Monday, May 14. This means that Tuesday, May 15 it will rain ducklings that will be jumping from the boxes.



WDFW for WWA

Moses Lake and Potholes Reservoir Canada Goose Nest Survey Results, 2000-2018

Canada goose nest surveys have historically been conducted on Moses Lake islands between 1981 and 2018, and on Potholes Reservoir islands between 1997 and 2017, but with varying volunteer effort and survey dates. **WDFW** plans to require a more stringent protocol in the future to ensure results are comparable between years. Seeing an increase or decrease between years does not mean anything when effort has changed between years. We need to survey within the same timeframe, account for the number of people searching, and ensure everyone follows the same guidelines when searching and noting nest status. Predation can be difficult to differentiate from hatching, at times.

Moses Lake Islands:

If we ignore the change in effort between years, data collected on 6 islands between years 2000 and 2018 appear to indicate the total number of geese nests found has remained fairly stable on 3 islands (South of Crest, Goat and Heron). The number of nests found on Crest Island and Gailey's Island are much lower in recent years between 2008 and 2018. These are larger islands, which may be experiencing disturbance from human visitation or predators. Garbage is present on many islands (shotgun shells, plastic, chair remnants, etc), although human intrusion is not likely solely during hunting season. Marsh Island was inconsistently surveyed due to the difficulty of wading through tall emergent vegetation, and South of Crest Island is also inundated with water, making searching difficult and altering effort between years.

Nest status indicates whether eggs are still being incubated, whether they hatched, whether they have been predated, or whether the nest was abandoned. These values are difficult to compare between years due to the different dates of survey effort and the varying knowledge for assessment between observers. If we assume all volunteers correctly and consistently assessed nest status, ignore the different survey dates between years, and ignore the small sample sizes on each island, the data would indicate predation has been present on most islands between 2004 and 2018 and has increased on some islands between 2008 and 2018.

Potholes Reservoir Islands:

Effort conducted on **Potholes Reservoir** varied tremendously between years, ranging between 25 and 126 islands surveyed in a given year. For this reason, we averaged the number of nests found in a given Area Unit of the Reservoir based upon the number of islands surveyed in that Unit. As a result, the value for "total nests" in the charts below are a fraction rather than a whole number.

The number of, and experience of, surveyors cannot be accounted for and still lend variation in effort between years. If we ignore the change in effort between years, data collected between years 1997 and 2017 appears to indicate no obvious trends. Some Units increase, some decrease, and all are up and down across the years.


Predation rates do not appear to be an increasing problem on these islands. Better consistent data collection is necessary to evaluate trends, although nesting is still taking place on many islands and hatching is successful to some extent on most islands where nests are found.






Examples of the status of two (2) Moses Lake island nests as a percent of total nests (abandoned nests make up the difference). Total nests are the Secondary Axis.


