The County Council Clerk is scheduling the ordinance for introduction on the Council's September 24 agenda, with the **public hearing to follow on October 8!**




Work Party at Nooksack Wildlife Area

The event will run from 10 am to 4 pm at the Tacoma Sportsmen's Club, 16409 Canyon Road E, Puyallup. See Flyer on Page 5.

WWA stores its Duck Mount Display Trailer here, and will set it up and staff it at this year's event. Any WWA members not heading to a **WWA** banquet that day — south to Vancouver for the Lower Columbia Chapter banquet or north to Mount Vernon for the Northwest Chapter banquet — who can volunteer to pull a shift between 10 am and 4 pm, please contact either **Bruce Burns** at (253-961-8802) or Kurt Snyder at (360-485-9353).

"This family-oriented event is a great way to introduce youth to target shooting, hunting, fishing, and conservation activities," said David Whipple, WDFW Hunter Education Division Manager.

WDFW invites youth, with their parent or guardian, to participate in shooting sports with department-owned archery equipment, pellet guns, .22 rifles, .223 rifles, and 20 gauge shotguns.

Participants can also enjoy educational displays and hands-on activities including trout fishing, fly tying, rod and reel casting practice, flint knapping, making plaster animal track casts, fish prints, seed balls, and butterfly houses. In addition, all youth participants will receive a reusable drawstring bag with several shooting and outdoor safety-related items. Local and national retailers will also have door prize drawings and giveaways at the event.

"This is a great opportunity to receive training, **By: Bruce Burns** guidance, and encouragement from certified Hunter Education Instructors, Master Hunters, and Range Safety Officers," according to Whipple.


Turnbull NWR Work Party

Ridgefield NWR Youth Hunt Day



Only youth will be issued reservations to the morning hunt on this day. Therefore no adult reservations will be accepted for this day. Hunters 15 years of age or younger are eligible for this special hunting opportunity and must be accompanied by an supervising non-hunting adult at least 18 years old.

Hunting fees will be waived for all youth and supervising adults. All other refuge hunting program regulations will apply. Also be careful to have appropriate small game license and free state (stamp) validation prior to the hunt. The Refuge has no ability to issue licenses or validations on the day of the hunt! Please also note, goose hunting will not be allowed during youth hunt day. Hunting on this day will be limited to ducks and coot. Supervising adults may not possess firearms in the blind until noon, when general public hunting resumes for the remainder of the hunting day.

At noon, unoccupied blinds will be assigned via a ping pong ball lottery for the general public. After the noon blind assignment, the remainder of the day will resume a typical first-come first-serve procedure to occupy vacant blinds. At noon, adults supervising youth hunters with valid licenses/stamps can hunt for the duration of the day.

To Apply: Simply mail a postcard to Youth Hunt Day, POB 457 Ridgefield, WA 98642 or- deliver it in person to Refuge Headquarters at 28908 NW Main Ave, Ridgefield, WA. Postcards must be RECEIVED by close of business on October 4th 2019. On the post card please list your name, age, and a mailing address.

<u>Applications are due on October 4th, 2019.</u> Applicants that apply by this date will receive reservations to pick first from the available hunting blinds. Missed the deadline? If you arrive at the check station on the morning of Youth Hunt Day, at least 1 3/4 hours before shooting time, you will be able to choose from the blinds remaining after the reservation youth hunters. Given the typical number of applicants, there will likely be plenty of room on Youth Hunt Day. Please, consider joining the event. Questions? Office # 360 887-4106


October Meeting Guest Speaker



Willapa Bay Eel Grass and Early Migration Update

The steadily moving eelgrass die off continues to progress. I have been seeing waves of ducks passing through for over two (2) weeks — Green wing teal, as normal for August and some major movements of Widgeon.

Per an old **Ducks Unlimited** article, it is normal for Widgeon to have an early component that moves through with early teal. I noted that the first week of September a few Pintail went through. The only place Widgeon seem to be holding is **Young's Bay** off **Columbia River** near **Astoria**.

Avoid the Rush, Complete Hunter Education Now

OLYMPIA The **Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW)** reminds prospective hunters to complete their hunter education class before hunting season.

"Since most hunting seasons don't open until September, summer is a great time to enroll in hunter education to ensure you can participate in fall hunting seasons," said **David Whipple, WDFW Hunter Education Division Manager.** "WDFW recommends completing a hunter education course early because late summer and fall courses fill quickly."

WDFW offers both traditional and online options to complete the hunter education requirement.

"The traditional classroom experience includes direct instruction from certified volunteer instructors, which can be important for younger students," **Whipple** said. "The online course offers the same content, but on the student's schedule. If you take the online course, you must still complete an in-person field skills evaluation." All hunters born after Jan. 1, 1972 must complete a hunter education course to buy a hunting license.

To find a course and learn about hunter education requirements, new hunters should visit the **WDFW** hunter education webpage at <u>https://wdfw.wa.gov/hunting/</u>requirements/education/basic.

Those who are unable to complete a hunter education course before the fall hunting seasons may qualify for a hunter education deferral. For more information on the deferral, visit <u>https://wdfw.wa.gov/hunting/</u> <u>requirements/education/deferral-program</u>.




