
Thanks to All who Attended the Public Hearing

Members from the **Whatcom Chapter** and **WWA Corporate Board** spoke passionately and made some strong points in an October 8th public hearing in front of the **Whatcom County Council** opposing a proposed No Shooting Zone encompassing all of **Drayton Harbor**.

Corporate President Rick Holt interjected some much needed levity in the chambers by explaining that he was responsible for all the elaborate woodworking in the room. When the laughter subsided he explained the mission and purpose of **WWA** to the room and represented the group very well. **Corporate Treasurer John Arrabito**, a retired attorney, summarized existing state law regarding hunting in this area. The **County Council** was unaware of many of the laws protecting hunting, especially the state law that specifically exempts noise from firearm[s] during the course of hunting as a legal reason to impose a No Shooting Zone.

Whatcom Chapter Treasurer Matt Berry presented the *Change.org petition* that had gathered 1,100+ signatures in just the two (2) weeks leading up to the hearing. Whatcom Chapter Chair Lyle Galloway spoke on hunting safety and shotgun ballistics. Other Whatcom Chapter members made great points to the Council including Anthony Giebel, Pete Adams, Jessie Dwight, Rodney Vandersypen. Members from both the Lummi and Swinomish Tribes made passionate arguments against the proposed Shooting Ban!

WDFW Officer Ryan Valentine stated in his 16 years service in Whatcom County he had received no verified reports regarding safety issues and firearms in **Drayton Harbor**.



High end golf properties and the City of Blaine wish to impose a No Shooting Zone on the entire Drayton Harbor Area of Whatcom County.

He also corrected statements made by some area residents regarding shooting noise from 5 a.m. in the morning, noting that it's impossible to see in the darkness at 5 a.m., and quoted the official hunting regulations that legal hunting begins no earlier than 6 a.m. <u>Facts</u> provided by **Officer Valentine** were very supportive of our cause and offered great insight.

Due to a lack of any concrete data from the proponents of the ban, the **County Council** decided to postpone a vote to give the **City of Blaine** time to produce evidence of safety issues posed by hunters. The **Whatcom Chapter** is preparing some data of our own for the upcoming committee meeting in four (4) weeks.



The annual **Veteran's Hunt** at the **Refuge** will be held Sunday, November 10th.

Ridgefield NWR Youth Hunt Day



Only youth will be issued reservations to the morning hunt on this day. Therefore no adult reservations will be accepted for this day. Hunters 15 years of age or younger are eligible for this special hunting opportunity and must be accompanied by an supervising non-hunting adult at least 18 years old.

Hunting fees will be waived for all youth and supervising adults. All other refuge hunting program regulations will apply. Also be careful to have appropriate small game license and free state (stamp) validation prior to the hunt. The Refuge has no ability to issue licenses or validations on the day of the hunt! Please also note, goose hunting will not be allowed during youth hunt day. Hunting on this day will be limited to ducks and coot. Supervising adults may not possess firearms in the blind until noon, when general public hunting resumes for the remainder of the hunting day.

At noon, unoccupied blinds will be assigned via a ping pong ball lottery for the general public. After the noon blind assignment, the remainder of the day will resume a typical first-come first-serve procedure to occupy vacant blinds. At noon, adults supervising youth hunters with valid licenses/stamps can hunt for the duration of the day.

To Apply: Simply mail a postcard to Youth Hunt Day, POB 457 Ridgefield, WA 98642 or- deliver it in person to Refuge Headquarters at 28908 NW Main Ave, Ridgefield, WA. Postcards must be RECEIVED by close of business on October 4th 2019. On the post card please list your name, age, and a mailing address.

<u>Applications are due on October 4th, 2019.</u> Applicants that apply by this date will receive reservations to pick first from the available hunting blinds. Missed the deadline? If you arrive at the check station on the morning of Youth Hunt Day, at least 1 3/4 hours before shooting time, you will be able to choose from the blinds remaining after the reservation youth hunters. Given the typical number of applicants, there will likely be plenty of room on Youth Hunt Day. Please, consider joining the event. Questions? Office # 360 887-4106



Farmed Island Tour

On Saturday, October 6th the **NW Chapter** members and guests met up at the **Skagit Wildlife Area Headquarters** boat launch for our annual tour of the **Farmed Island** and surrounding waterways. The **Farmed Island** is 240 acres and is identified as the **"Island Unit"** by

the **Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW).** It's one of 16 **Skagit Wildlife Area** sites. We cruised in five (5) boats a short distance up the **South Fork Skagit River** and met **Curran Cosgrove (WDFW)** at the lower landing.

Curran and other **WDFW** employees annually plant waterfowl foraging crops on the island. This year over 120 acres were planted providing a critical food source for migrating waterfowl throughout the season. Crops include barley, millet, fava beans, buckwheat and corn.

Curran guided the tour group to several locations on the Island, providing information on the type of crops planted and pointing out hunt blind locations. A few of us also cruised **Steamboat Slough** to the island backside out to **Skagit Bay.** Thanks to everyone who attended, those that brought their boats (**Rick Holt, Brandon Ballard, Tom Elliott, Steve Massingale, Rick Billieu**) and to **Curran Cosgrove** for once again volunteering his time to show us this unique island gem.

Youth Pheasant Hunt Results

We had 36 young people show up for the **Youth Pheasant Hunt** on Saturday, September 21st, at the **Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW)** site off of Stratford Road and Road 10 N.E. The young hunters received a T-shirt & cap from Pheasants Forever, and a duck call, Pintail whistle, and lanyard from **WWA-Moses Lake.**

WDFW released over 100 birds for the youths to hunt in small groups with adult supervisors and dogs. Many of the youths were able to harvest two (2) birds, and we received many thanks for putting on the event. Everybody received a free lunch of hamburgers and hot dogs plus all the fixing's and beverages.

One thing we observed was that even though all the youth had been through **Hunter Safety Training**, the majority of the first-time hunters did not know how to mount their gun! I don't know if other chapters are noticing this at their events, but to all members that have young first-time hunters in the family, it would certainly help them if they were to practice mounting their gun at home prior to going afield to hunt.

I haven't received any input about the Youth Waterfowl Hunt in Eastern Washington on Saturday, September 28th, but I can state without question it was a miserable day to be out. We had steady winds at 20 mph and above plus on and off rain downpours. If you were out hunting I hope you were safe and had a fair hunt.

Waterfowl Scouting Report (As of Oct. 1st)

For those trekking over the Cascades to hunt waterfowl, there are good numbers of birds on **Potholes Reservoir** already, and I've seen the numbers of ducks & geese on **Moses Lake** increasing, and I'm sure this cold weather we just experienced the first week of October will be bringing more into the area. The reports I've received say that the Northern areas received a lot of rain and snow which should start the birds South.

Please hunt safely and take no unnecessary chances, we don't want to lose any members to an accident!!

Possible Habitat Projects

One is a group of ponds north of the Winchester Reserve. There is a lot of WA Waterfowl Stamp & Print

money committed to this project, but not enough to really put it over the top. **WDFW** is looking for a partner that can contribute to the project in the form of money, seed/ materials donation, volunteer hours, etc., — items that would help them bolster their small **North American Wetlands Conservation Act (NAWCA)** grant application.

If **WWA** could commit some more money or manpower to be used for matching funds it would really help to complete the project. **WWA-Moses Lake** is willing to commit \$500 to \$1000 for seed money, and I'm sure we can come up with the volunteer help to make the project a success.

Maybe the **WWA Corporate** or other west side Chapter[s] that have considerable numbers of members who hunt this area of the state might want to contribute also.

The second project is in the **Royal Lakes** area. **WDFW** is still in the process of "fleshing out" this project, but feel it would be a good candidate for an **Aquatic Lands Enhancement Account (ALEA)** grant.

Susewind has held a series of in-person and digital open houses across the state since 2018.

ALEA Grants Available for Non-Profits

Over the years WDFW's Aquatic Lands

Enhancement Account (ALEA) Grant Program has supported hundreds of individuals and organizations who have undertaken a variety of projects that engage volunteers and benefit fish and wildlife resources. **ALEA** grants are in high demand; therefore, **WDFW** follows a competitive process to select recipients.

What projects are eligible for funding?

Many project types are eligible, including:

- Habitat activities that restore and/or preserve fish and wildlife habitat.
- Research activities that increase our knowledge of fish and wildlife species.
- Education efforts to share information or provide hands-on experiences to enhance public knowledge of fish, wildlife and their habitats.
- Facility development efforts to provide or enhance access to fish and wildlife related recreational opportunities; and
- Artificial production efforts to rear and release fish or wildlife to restore populations or for public recreation.

Applicants must obtain pre-approval from **WDFW** to be eligible for funding. Eligible applicants include individual citizens, **non-profit organizations**, schools and universities, conservation districts, and tribal governments. For-profit businesses, state, and federal agencies are not eligible.

Grant Guidelines

The **ALEA Policies & Procedures Manual** describes grant guidelines, which include:

- Grant funds are available on a cost reimbursement basis.
- Funds may not be used for direct wages, benefits, or stipends.
- Grantees must register volunteers and report volunteer hours.
- Grant recipients must follow state purchasing rules.
 Equipment purchased with grant funds must be returned to the department at project completion, and
- Project outcomes must be available to the public per RCW 77.100, *et, seq.*




